

not satisfy the good faith requirement. If...if it's something minor, he's certainly not required to go out and check people's IDs to see...and have blood tests to see if they're somehow related to the individual, that's certainly not required. So it's a good faith standard which would depend on the individual circumstances in different cases. But, generally, I think it's a standard that can be delineated for the doctors that they would be able to follow. In closing, and just...it's been a good discussion. Senator Landis has raised some good questions about it. Hopefully, they've been answered. I do believe that this has been worked to the extent that it...that the only problem, I think, that it might have is that which was raised by Senator Wesely and Senator Landis that it may become too technical. The reason it became as technical as it is is because it attempts to provide safeguards. It attempts to balance the safeguards versus the ability of the patient to be able to control his or her own destiny, to be able to control the treatment he or she is to be given, to have that person's value system projected into the future so that it is taken into consideration when treatment is afforded to that individual. The concept, I think, is an excellent concept as far as to project those wishes. I think the bill, itself, has been...tried to take into account most of the...most of the problems that we have envisioned as we continue on debate on the adoption of the amendments and the advancement of the bill, I'd be certainly happy to continue to try to answer questions. I'd urge the adoption of the amendment.
