CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Elmer's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted. We are on the bill as amended. Anyone wishing to discuss the bill as amended? Seeing no one, Senator Elmer, do you wish to close?

SENATOR ELMER: Waive close.

SPEAKER BAACK: Waives closing. We'll now vote on the advancement of LB 126. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 126.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 126 advances. As I announced earlier, LB 736 has been pulled from the agenda. We will now go to LB 757.

CLERK: LB 757, Mr. President, introduced by the Banking Committee and signed by its members. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 23 of 1991, referred to Banking Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: The Chair of the Banking Committee, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Speaker Baack. This bill, 757, is the Department of Banking and Finance's cleanup bill. We don't usually do them on an annual basis, because I think they've been a little more careful in their statutes. But every couple years they bring us a bill in which they harmonize Nebraska provisions with federal law changes. This bill is a mishmash of a number of provisions that has no special, central theme, other than making a variety of administrative changes such as allowing our Department of Banking and Finance to share examination records with the Credit Union Administration. That's a national organization reviewing federal credit union information. It also allows us to share examination records with the Office of Thrift Supervision so that we can exchange information about savings and loans. It allows the department to establish
