CLERK: Madam President, Senator Moore would move to amend. Senator, I now have AM2552 in front of me. (Moore amendment appears on page 528 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Amendment 2552, which has also been passed out and should be on your desks, simply what this amendment does is it makes the state law supreme in how we deal with these vending machines. So it makes it uniform across the state that if the bill moves, as now amended, which I hope it does, in my opinion, it would basically say the Bee Village Council can't pass more stringent laws on vending machines in their own locality. And so it's one of those things, it's the issue of where do you want the control. And I think it's...if this is the policy of the State of Nebraska, it should be uniform across the state, and so I'd ask for the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Moore. Mr. Clerk, do you have an announcement?

CLERK: Very quickly, Madam President. General Affairs Committee, Senator Schellpeper as Chair, would like to have an Exec Session of General Affairs underneath the south balcony now. General Affairs, south balcony, now.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. I'll recognize senators wishing to address this amendment. Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Madam President and members of the body, Senator Moore, I just want to ask you a question. I want to reread this again and make certain that I understand what this amendment would say is that if an ordinance passes that's either less restrictive or more restrictive from the provisions of this act, then the act itself will prevail.

SENATOR MOORE: That's the intent of my amendment, yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Either less or more, it doesn't...

SENATOR MOORE: It just says that this is...this is the law for the state in all localities as well.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.
