SENATOR MOORE: And so, if you wanted to...I don't...if they wanted to...I don't want a locality to say you can have any vending machines, nor do I want a locality to be able to say you can have a vending machine down at the Dairy Queen.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Nor do you want any locality to say that bars in restaurants can't have vending machines?

SENATOR MOORE: Cannot?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Cannot.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes, yes, I do not.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well then, Senator Moore, I guess I would have to oppose this amendment, which I didn't think I was going to oppose originally when I saw it filed. If we had not passed your amendment I would have considered the bill to be fairly restrictive and probably would not have had any problem with your amendment. With that, I guess I'll just recommend that we don't adopt this amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, I have a question to ask of Senator Moore. Senator Moore, did I hear you correctly on your other amendment saying that in small towns there are restaurants and places where minors go, and those people want to be able to purchase cigarettes there?

SENATOR MOORE: I did not say minors. Do they want to? They probably do want to, I don't want them to, though.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Didn't you say something, though, about in small towns the restaurant, where the liquor is sold, is a place where people buy these cigarettes?

SENATOR MOORE: There is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you make a reference to that?

SENATOR MOORE: In many small towns the local cafe or bar is the gathering place in town, and you have adults and minors in that place, yes.
