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available to minors. This is a bad amendment, but it's not the main amendment that Senator Moore wanted, because he got that one already. The ads can target the young people, and there will be facilities available for those young people to go and obtain cigarettes, thanks to Senator Moore and 18 others who voted with him. We're going to have other occasions when people are going to stand on this floor, and it's politically nice to do it because some of us are up for reelection, to talk about family...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...values, to talk about looking out for our children, and it's a lot of nonsense, hogwash, it's hypocrisy. This is one of the gravest issues facing this society, because cigarettes and tobacco products constitute the largest preventable cause of death in this country and in this state. The largest preventable cause of death, and we want our children exposed to it. If you'll expose them to the cigarettes, let them have marijuana, because that doesn't kill as many. Let them have crack and cocaine, those don't kill as many. Let them drive when they're 13, because those accidents don't kill as many. At least this amendment should be defeated so if there are better people in these towns than there are on the floor of this Legislature, let that better concern for the children...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...manifest itself.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I would like to recognize Senator Moore, please, Madam President.

SENATOR MOORE: Recognizing the error of my ways, having a difficult time arguing against local control, I'd like to withdraw this amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Moore. The amendment is withdrawn. Are there further amendments on the desk, Mr. Clerk?
