

death of someone while you are driving while intoxicated and their death results, motor vehicle homicide. The penalty for motor vehicle homicide is a felony. However, the key and the problem, you may have seen this across the state and in a couple of areas, the license revocation that occurs, that license revocation goes on while you sit in jail. And so there really is no meaningful penalty for loss of license once you are out of the penitentiary or county jail, depending on where you serve the sentence. We've had occasions where you're eligible immediately then for your license. What the change would do is put the license revocation at the end of your term of imprisonment. So you would have a meaningful, driving penalty in the criminal area once you're out of incarceration. The third change is a major policy change. Where do the drunk driving laws of the State of Nebraska occur? Where does the law cover you? Right now the laws occur on highways. This change would say that we're going to change it to everywhere, except private property, which is not open to public access. What's that mean? Westroads parking lot, apartment complexes, the parking lots, regular businesses, it could be the parking lot of a bar, some states have this law apply everywhere. You couldn't even go out into your own field and drive drunk, it's a matter of state policy. So there is that on one end, where you could have the policy of the laws applying absolutely everywhere in the State of Nebraska, or you could have it apply only on the roads. This strikes the balance and says that it is going to be everywhere except private property which is not open to public access. And later on I want to lay some foundation and some intent of what those areas are. Our fourth change allows for ignition interlock. This is not a panacea, this doesn't apply for everyone. Ignition interlock, though, has been proposed by several members of the Legislature as another way to fight drunk driving. It also is a way to help some people cope with living with the law and the penalties that you incur. Ignition interlock is a device that is installed in your car that will not allow the car to be started if you have the presence of alcohol. And then there can be various levels set, usually it's a low amount of alcohol that it would tolerate, but much over that you wouldn't not be able to start the car. I think you'll probably see us have considerable discussion this morning about do interlocks work. They are currently being used in the State of Nebraska, this would allow them to be used as a condition of probation. This would be a way for some people to at least still operate a motor vehicle. It would be primarily, perhaps, for some of the hard-core drinkers, but it still will not short
