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SENATOR LYNCH: I understand.

SENATOR ROBINSON: I think it's just...it's just the old creep that we get into every bill, you know, every A bill that...do we really need it. I think we've got to ask ourselves that question. Next year, you know, it's going to be another disease, and so I'll support the bill. I haven't decided whether I'll support the A bill or not.

SPEAKER BAACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Robinson. Senator Warner, you're next.

SENATOR WARNER: Yeah, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, in reviewing this legislation I have no problem at all with the intent. Senator Lynch made reference, though, that the bill was copied after the Cancer Registry. As I recall there was a bill that went through last session that modified some of the procedures for the...that was applicable to the Cancer Registry after experience with it, I understand there may be legislation pending that modifies that somewhat this session. I guess my question maybe initially to Senator Lynch, maybe Senator Wesely could respond, I'm wondering if it would be appropriate to put into this bill, which obviously was drafted before that legislation was enacted last session, some of the provisions that was contained in the legislation affecting the Cancer Registry, my assumption is that with experience they learned some things that should be changed, if, on Select File, would be appropriate to add into this bill the same provisions. Maybe Senator Lynch wants to comment, or Senator Wesely.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yes, Senator Warner, I'm not quite sure what bill we're referring to, but we're certainly open to taking a look at what that amendment might provide in the Cancer Registry. Not only was the attempt made there so we could identify those with the disease of cancer, but also identify areas of the state where unique and particular diseases seem to be more prevalent than in other areas of the state, and what the registry has provided is that, in fact, in some areas of the state there are forms of cancer that need special attention. And, as a result of that, the health providers can be even more alert and aware of that circumstance, and if an environment exists that causes that particular kind of cancer in that area, we can do something about it quicker. That's the prevention
