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side of that registry bill, just as it is for this one. And we will look at...and we're open, of course I'm sure, to language, if it would help us better perform the responsibility for the head injury registry.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, if I have time left, I wonder if Senator Wesely could give any thoughts as to...

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, Senator Wesely, would you respond, please.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes.

SENATOR WARNER: ...what kind of changes were made.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, thank you. Senator Warner, you're correct in your remarks. There was, when we adopted the Cancer Registry bill, some ten years ago, then waited to have it privately established, and that occurred very slowly, finally we publicly established it. There were very strict restrictions in the statute about who had access to the information, and both last year and this year we have had legislation that clarified that. And I think you would need to look at the current language that we have, because we found we were so careful with that information, it was too restrictive, and yet it is apparent that information of this sort ought to have a privacy aspect to it. So I think we have learned some lessons from the Cancer Registry, and I think the language may or may not fit directly, but it would certainly be a place to start. Senator Lynch does have in here a section, Section 7, that deals with confidentiality. But we could take a look at that and compare it to the other and see what might work, and I think we could find a way to work this out pretty quickly.

SENATOR WARNER: If I have any time left, Mr. President, it would seem logical, particularly if we expand these kinds of registry to other similar incidents that may happen, that there is a degree of conformity that, assuming it is appropriate for that particular type of situation, but it would seem logical to have some uniformity, number one. Number two, to have learned, if we have learned some better ways to do it from that experience, it would be well to adopt it.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Rasmussen.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I
