

where there might be underlying contentions because this person didn't participate in drafting the bill or that one didn't, and the contention is to pass a bill or not to pass it, rather than to get it at what we, as legislators, have to really be concerned about.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Although Senator Beyer has been working on this for five years, as I understand, and I think it probably has had two hearings, if I am not mistaken before the Government Committee, and Senator Beyer is nodding his head yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But that, just the fact that Senator Beyer has been working on it for five years doesn't...hasn't succeeded in eliminating any of these bad problems and this is not to disparage Senator Beyer. I am saying that the people in the profession have not really been as supportive of him as they should have been...

PRESIDENT MOUL PRESIDING

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...nor those who drafted this legislation really complied with what is to be done under the law in creating these agencies and giving them power, and I won't blame the bill drafters because they are not to write ideas into legislation, they just take what they are given and then put it in the terminology. Oh, that is all the questions I have right now. Thank you, Senator Pirsch. The motion that I have before us is to bracket this bill until April 16. That would be after we are out of session. Then I think we ought to have a study of the private investigating or detective field, and determine in a very deliberative and deliberate way what that profession ought to consist of and the way it will be regulated and the requirements that will obtain for becoming a member of it.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler, followed by Senator Beyer and Senator Schimek. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I don't think that I am going to be in favor of Senator Chambers' motion. I suppose it is the difference between seeing problems with a bill and believing or not believing that those problems can be addressed between now and Select File.
