I also, personally, take offense to the comment I heard once or twice on the floor, on the body here, that they cast their votes yes or no, worrying about or concerned about their election. I think that was in poor taste, personally. I wouldn't change my mind regardless of what I think might happen in my election. But maybe there is some people in here that do, I don't know. But I think that's a sad state of affairs. I have a daughter that's a nurse in Omaha, and some of the stories that she can tell when attending to some of these girls that have had an abortion is very shocking, it's something that's probably going to live with these girls for a long time.
