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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR WARNER: ...along the interstate.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: All right.

SENATOR WARNER: But where you normally find it is only in the zoning area of a municipality. The only exception I can think of would be where there is potential around an interchange some place.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That would be a good example. Well I, again, oppose and I want to recall Senator Landis used the point of utilities. And I couldn't help but throw in about utilities, you said you give an easement. Actually you don't give an easement to a utility, most farmers feel, they take one from you. And most...I have several that are very upset with all the easements they've had to give. That's out across the county. So it's...I don't think the greenbelt would apply in this case because that is a fairly...not adjacent to a developed area where land values escalate. But that is kind of the problem, I believe, if we would go to using the term exclusively in our Constitution. If we want to tighten this out, it would appear to me that we ought to do it legislatively, by statute, rather than making our...making our Constitution much more exclusive, using the word exclusive in that. So therefore I would oppose this amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Hall, you're next.

SENATOR HALL: Question.

SPEAKER BAACK: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. We will now vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Debate has ceased. Senator Chambers. would you like to close on your amendment to the committee amendment.
