SENATOR LYNCH: Madam Chairman and members, what this reconsideration will provide through LB 6 is the same kind of thing we considered when some of us, for those of us who voted for the legislation that would provide funds should a special election take place. Some of us did not want a special election, but we supported the effort on the floor to provide the funds should that happen. My opinion, this particular piece of...this particular piece of legislation does the very same thing. It is an indication and an act of good faith on our part so that we can administratively carry out the responsibilities, not only of the Legislature, but of the courts as well in this case. So I don't think it has to be complicated by the fact that it might be 60, 70, 80, or even two pages long. It is the vehicle necessary for us to do in a much more meaningful way what probably can be accomplished anyway. And so if you, in fact, were like a lot of us who didn't like the idea of a special election but supported the legislation to provide the funds, should we have one, remember that. This is no different from that, and, hopefully, based on that kind of reasoning, you can and should support it.
