

these amendments were not adopted, and I offered the motion to reconsider because I was not present in the Chamber when we considered these amendments. I think that Senator Hall has done an excellent job of explaining what these amendments really do. They are just technical kinds of changes that are necessary to facilitate the process of putting the property back onto the tax rolls. That is what these amendments do, and should we not have these amendments, we don't have the proper kind of tools necessary for the assessors and the people that are required to put these back on, they don't have the tools, they don't have the timing to do it properly, if we don't do this. And I agree with Senator Hall, if we are not even going to do this, we are not even going to add these amendments that make this bill, that makes this bill work properly, there is no use us staying around here anymore. So I would ask you to reconsider this vote, then adopt the amendments, and then you can...then if you don't like the bill and you want to discuss the merits of the bill at that point, then I say that is where you cast your red vote, but you don't do it here. I think you do it when you are talking about the issue and not about the technicalities of the bill, and these are simply technical changes that facilitate the process. With that, I would ask you to vote to reconsider the vote that was taken yesterday. Thank you.
