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well aware of, and I'm sure the recruiters do a good job of laying it out, one of those things is the 75 percent tuition remission relative to attending a Nebraska institution. And I think that they were bribed. Now we haven't got into the discussion. A lot of discussion seems to be that we shouldn't have such a program. Well, that wasn't in front of us and maybe a part of the amendment could have included a discussion as to whether or not we wanted to close this off for the future. But we're talking about the one thousand and one hundred and some students that are currently planning, working on their higher educational degrees, undergraduate degree, if you will, because it's limited to undergraduate only, that they're already involved in it. They were promised something. Some of them did serve in Desert Storm. Some of them maybe have served nothing more than flood control and their basic training and then the like that goes with it. But the promise was that if you come onto our organization, if you make this commitment to us, we will assure you a higher educational support to the tune of 75 percent of your tuition. One of the other considerations in terms of the burden to the university, I think that when you look at these eleven hundred men and women who are currently involved in the program, many of them are part-time students, some of them are taking six hours. I think Senator Schimek, as I left the Chamber for a moment, alluded to one gentleman that came in that is working, he's doing everything in his power, has, I think, four children and he's working his way through this program, taking a few hours this semester and then some the next. But as you look at this whole twist, I think if you bring that tuition support and make the student, make the National Guard student pay for 50 percent of his tuition, he's going to drop off on the number of hours he takes. He can't afford it. And so from an institutional perspective, I think you're going to be cutting into the amount of FTE that is being generated. This is not only recruitment into the National Guard, this is recruitment for Nebraska youth, in most cases, to also procure higher education, higher education that then converts into a Cash Fund, to some extent, for the institutions. And I don't know what kind of a model you would use but if, in fact, the institution had to absorb 25 percent of this, and we don't want to do that, but make the student absorb 50 percent or an additional 25 percent to make the thing work, how many hours are they going to drop off taking that the university isn't going to get anyway? Because those are Cash Funds they're not going to get because the student is going to back down on the amount of credit hour activity that he's engaged in in a given point. And
