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of these children, approximately, suffer some sort of disability. Many of them have behavior problems that are a combination of many reasons. But, in recent studies, it's been noted that most of these children have had a history of neglect and of sexual abuse, and many of the behaviors that are a result of that sexual abuse, such as withdrawal, depression, inability to concentrate, sexual acting out, nightmares, running away, I think illustrate that these type of children are much more difficult to care for than other children. We have a terrible problem in this state in placing these kids right now and now we're just segregating them in one more instance. We all know, no matter how unfortunate it is, how cruel that other children can be in these situations. And I think Mary Dean Harvey made a point very, very clearly in testimony on this bill that we, really, when we start segregating these children out of who is going to pay and who isn't going to pay, it gives ammunition to the children in that same school district of poking fun, of ridiculing these children who are not in their own homes and they very unfortunately have to be placed as wards of the state. So I think we have to keep in mind that we're dealing with kids, we're dealing with people. We aren't just dealing with dollars and cents. When we look at the amendment on the desk we start looking at the absolute ridiculousness of separating foster homes and group homes and child caring agencies and I certainly think it's better at least to exempt some of these people. But we have...we have a base of how foster homes and group homes are determined in the State of Nebraska based on the number of children that are supposed to be cared for. Foster homes are supposed to include one to eight kids; groups homes, six to twelve children; child caring agencies is unlimited but normally over twelve. Unfortunately, when there is no place to place a child in the State of Nebraska, many times they are placed in a foster home that runs over its capacity. In the Omaha area alone we have one foster homes that's currently caring for twelve children. This is a foster home. They're not going to receive any relief under this amendment. Another in Omaha has nine. Those are only two that have been pointed out to me. The school district in which they are being educated are not going to see any...is not going to see any relief whatsoever. They're going to have their state aid taken away. Where right down the street...
