Any Fiscal Notes received from state agencies and political subdivisions are attached following the Legislative Fiscal Analyst Estimate.

This bill would provide grants for juvenile indigent legal defense, and it becomes operative on October 15, 2021.

The bill creates the Juvenile Indigent Defense Fund. The Fund is to be administered by the Commission on Public Advocacy, and is only be used to provide legal services to juveniles, provide resources to assist counties in providing for legal counsel for indigent juveniles, and to pay the costs of administering the Juvenile Indigent Defense Grant Program.

The Fund's revenue source is a \$1 court fee known as the Juvenile Indigent Defense Fee, and is estimated to bring in about \$300,000 annually. Because the bill has an operative date of October 15, 2021, the fee will only be in effect for 8 months in FY2021-22 and is estimated to generate \$200,000.

A county may apply for a grant under the program beginning October 15, 2022. Counties receiving grants are required to report annually to the commission regarding juveniles served under this bill.

The commission shall submit an annual report to the Legislature concerning the distribution and use of funds from grants provided under the program.

The Commission on Public Advocacy estimates a cost of \$7,500 in FY2021-22. This amount includes a one-time cost of \$5,000 to contract with outside legal counsel to draft rules and regulations, and to hold hearings required by the Administrative Procedures Act. In both FY2021-22 and FY2022-23, the Commission estimates expenses of \$2,500 to reimburse commissioners for mileage, lodging, and meals. These estimated costs come from the Juvenile Indigent Defense Fund, a Cash Fund.

Because this bill changes provisions regarding a juvenile's right to representation by counsel at county expense, it could have a fiscal impact to some counties. As noted above, a grant program is established that is intended to offset any fiscal impacts to counties created by this bill.

COMMENTS: Do not disagree with the Commission on Public Advocacy estimate of potential Cash Fund impact on the Agency relative to operating expenses associated with the provisions of LB 308. The Agency did identify a \$1 Indigent Defense Fee created by LB 308 could generate approximately \$300,000 per year in Cash Fund Revenues for the new program, however, the fiscal note does not identify as expenditures, any amounts relative to aid for providing grants with this funding, which is the purpose of the bill.
