Senator Hefner reports 483 to General File.

Your committee on Ag whose Chairman is Senator Schmit reports 283 be advanced to General File with amendments.

Your committee on Judiciary whose Chairman is Senator Nichol reports 413 to General File with amendments; 32 General File with amendments; 215 General File with amendments; 180 General File; 347 General File with amendments; 111 General File with amendment; 465 General File; 99 General File with aendments; 87 General File with amendments; 23 Indefinitely postponed; 90 Indefinitely postponed; 166 Indefinitely postponed; 175 Indefinitely postponed. (Signed) Senator Nichol, Chair.

Your committee on Urban Affairs whose Chairman is Senator Landis reports 437 to General File with amendments. (Signed) Senator Landis.

Mr. President, LB 128 was introduced by Senator Myron Rumery. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 13 and referred to Retirement for public hearing. It was advanced to General File. I have no amendments on the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Rumery, do you wish to explain the bill?

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if I could have your attention for a few minutes, I would appreciate it. We introduced this bill for these reasons. that should a member of the school employee's retirement system die before retirement, LB 128 would provide an option for the payment of benefits to the spouse of the member, if the spouse is the sole surviving beneficiary. Presently the law provides that if a teacher has twenty years service and is at least 55 years of age or thirty years of service regardless of age and dies before retirement, a monthly annuity for life would be paid the spouse if the spouse is the sole surviving beneficiary in an amount equal to the joint and survivor benefit that would have been paid if the deceased member had retired on the date of death. The joint and survivor benefit is a greatly reduced benefit. The amount of the reduction is determined by the age of the deceased member and the age of the spouse. There are times when the surviving spouse would prefer to have a lump sum benefit rather than a meager monthly payment for life. Often a surviving spouse of a deceased member needs funds for retraining or to enter another job market or to invest in a business that may have some opportunity. LB 128 would give a spouse who is the sole surviving beneficiary

amount of capital stock and surplus of that bank. To avail themselves of this alternative, the bank must not have a deposit more than 90% of the par value of approved securities pledged to secure that deposit. Now the question might arise as to who should approve these securities. The committee amendment simply places this responsibility with the city treasurer. Now the state auditor, Ray Johnson, testified and concurs that this section needs to be clarified. With that I would move that it be moved to E & R for initial.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill to E & R for review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the bill is advanced and we now go to LB 283.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 283 was offered by Senator Tom Vickers. (Read.) The bill was first read on January 16, referred to the Ag and Environment Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Agricultural and Environment Committee, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Schmit, will you move the committee amendments to 283?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I move the committee amendments to LB 283.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of committee amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The committee amendments are adopted. Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. Speaker and members, LB 283 is a bill to bring into consistency the state statutes in regarding farmer cooperatives of this state with some of the requirements of the federal government and also to change some of the statutes which, when the original statutes were put in place had some language dealing with cooperatives or dealing with incorporations that used that same language with farmer cooperatives and also those are out of compliance with some of the requirements of the federal law. One of the major

things that LB 283 does is under the federal requirements imposed by the Capper-Volstead Act that created the farmer cooperatives was that, one of the requirements was that the members of farmer cooperatives should in actuality be farmers, that the intention was not to create these cooperatives that could be controlled by people other than agricultural producers and as part of the regulations on that, because of the tax exempt statuses that some of the cooperatives have that fall under that type of an operation, if their membership changes so that a certain percentage is not agricultural producers, then they are no longer tax exempt from the IRS provisions imposed by the Capper-Volstead Act. Under our statutes it was not clear that that provision governing cooperatives did make that as a matter of course in consistency with the federal requirements. That is the major reason for 283. The other reason is that stock and nonstock cooperatives were treated a little bit differently also in the statutes and some changes need to be made in that regard. It makes the state law consistent also with federal require-The difference between a stock and a nonstock cooperaments. tive for those of you that might not know and it was a little bit difficult for me to get this clear in my mind also, stock cooperatives are those cooperatives that sell stock and have stockholders and nonstock cooperatives has members. Now normally in actuality most of the nonstock cooperatives are co-ops made up of co-ops if you will, co-ops that will be a band together to form a nonstock cooperative to purchase railroad cars, trucks or something of this nature, large expenditures that the co-ops then can share the use of. It is really a technical bill and as I say, it puts the statutes more in conformity with the federal requirements governing the co-ops of the State of Nebraska and I might indicate that the co-ops of the State of Nebraska, the farmer cooperatives are a very integral and important part of the agricul-tural economy of this state and we certainly urge the body's adoption of LB 283.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: I have a question of Senator Vickers if he would yield.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Certainly.

SENATOR DWORAK. Senator Vickers, I have looked at this bill a couple of times and I would be less than candid if I said I understood it completely. My first question is if this bill is not passed due to the nonconformity with federal legislation, what will the results be in the State of Nebraska next year?

SENATOR VICKERS: Well the results could be, Senator Dworak, that some of the co-ops might be found to be out of conformity as far as the tax exempt status is concerned and they would suddenly have to go back and pay taxes, back taxes for perhaps years in the past which would be quite an economic burden for many of the small farmer cooperatives.

SENATOR DWORAK: Second question is, on page 6 where you are changing the fees for incorporation for nonstock cooperative associations to that required by law of other nonprofit corporations, my question is what fee do they pay now and how will this fee change? Will that be raised or will that fee be lowered?

SENATOR VICKERS: Senator Dworak, that is a very good question and I don't think I have got that answer before me.

SENATOR DWORAK: Senator Vickers, if you could get that information to me...

SENATOR VICKERS: I certainly will.

SENATOR DWORAK: ... before this gets to Select File I am not going to badger your bill here because I don't have any reason to badger it but the third question is, the difference between stock and nonstock cooperatives. You tell me that the only stock cooperatives basically are the larger, are made up of stockholders of the larger nonstock cooperatives.

SENATOR VICKERS: That is not always the case but that is in most cases that is true.

SENATOR DWORAK: Are there small stock cooperatives?

SENATOR VICKERS: Small cooperatives?

SENATOR DWORAK: Right.

SENATOR VICKERS: Yes, there are.

SENATOR DWORAK: Okay, thank you, Senator Vickers.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Sieck.

SENATOR SIECK: Yes, Mr. President, I just want to say that I support this bill. I think the co-ops throughout the State of Nebraska do need this to get their house in order so to speak, to combine with the federal law. I move that we advance the bill as soon as we can.

SENATOR CLARK: The motion before the House is the advancement of LB 283. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Have you all voted on the advancement of 283? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The bill is advanced. We will now take up LB 87.

CLERK: Mr. President, LE 87 was introduced by Senator Marge Higgins. (Read.) The bill was read on January 12, referred to Judiciary. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Judiciary Committee.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Nichol on the committee amendments.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, this bill has to do with the decriminalization of alcoholism which we passed two or three years ago and Senator Higgins had a request from the City of Omaha inasmuch as they thought they had a problem with handling alcoholics that were on quasi public areas and so she will be visiting with you about that in a little bit but as far as the committee amendments are concerned, as originally drafted LB 87 would have eliminated several of the mandatory conditions which have to be currently followed before a police officer can take a person found to be intoxicated into custody. The original draft of the bill also provided for a new definition to be added in the bill of guas i public property. The committee amendments retain the disposition requirements to be followed by police officers but do incorporate a new definition of quasi public property. The Judiciary Committee amendments would also extend the time period a person could be held in civil protective custody from twelve hours to twenty-four hours. I ask for the adoption of the committee amendments.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Dworak, do you want to talk on the committee amendments? Your light is still on. Thank you. The committee amendments, should they or should they not be adopted, let's vote on it. Have you all voted on the committee amendments? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of committee amendments, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The committee amendments are adopted. I would like to introduce 17 students from Concordia College of Seward, Nebraska. Mrs. George Brandon and Richard Wegman are the instructors. They are in the North balcony. Would

The amendments will also allow a police officer to use the telephone to survey facilities to try to locate one with space. It will also allow an officer to contact only those facilities he knows will be likely to accept the individual rather than go to facilities that have previously had a record of not accepting them. It makes clear that civil protective custody can be used if no other facility is available to provide a place where the intoxicated derelict or alcoholic, whatever, can sleep off his intoxication until he is reasonably sober. Of course the other amendments were previously adopted, the committee amendments on General File.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Higgins amendment to LB 87. Senator Nichol. Excuse me, I'm sorry, Senator Wesely, you are first and then Senator Nichol.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I was wondering if Senator Higgins could yield to a couple of questions.
