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favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Have you all voted on the adoption of the committee amendments? Once more, have you all voted on the adoption of the committee amendments. Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 4 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the committee amendments.

SENATOR CLARK: The committee amendments are adopted. Now on the bill itself, Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Chairman, I move that LB 118 be advanced to E & R Initial.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any discussion on the advancement of the bill? If not, all those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 1 may, Mr. President, on advancement of the bill.

(See pages 1974 through 1977 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR NICHOL: I so move. Mr. Chairman.

PRESIDENT: Motion to adopt the amendment, the Nichol amendment to LB 346. Any discussion? If not, that is your opening and your clowing. The question is the adoption of the Nichol amendment on LB 346. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 4 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to adopt the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Motion carries. The amendment is adopted. Senator Nichol, would you move the bill back to E & R? Senator Nichol, would you move the bill back?

PRESIDENT: While we are waiting for everyone to register your presence, the Chair would like to introduce to the Legislature from Senator Wagner's District, Ellen Partsch of St. Paul: and Sister Marge Zumzow and Mrs. Polly Partsch. They are the two sisters and the wife of Frank Partsch of the World Herald. Would you please stand up, under the South balcony, ladies? Welcome to the Nebraska Legislature. Is that where you are? Wave to us. There you are. Welcome to the Nebraska Legislature. Would the Beaches stand up and be recognized? Welcome to the Nebraska Legislature. Register the presence, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: There is a quorum present, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: A quorum present, then, Mr. Clerk, is there any matter you want to read into the record before we proceed with LB 376?

CLERK: Mr. President, very quickly, your committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports they carefully examined and reviewed LB 129A and recommend that same be placed on Select File; 487A Select File; and 556A Select File. All signed by Senator Kilgarin, Chair.

PRESIDENT: We are ready then to proceed with LB 376.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have on LB 376 is an amendment by Senators Fitzgerald and DeCamp, I understand they wish to withdraw.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Fitzgerald, do you wish to withdraw that motion. All right, that motion is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is offered by Senator DeCamp. It is found on page 1982 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, members of the Legislature,

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days after the local decision is made by the mayor of the City of Lincoln or whatever town we are talking about. So, in three days time they have to decide and know how to go about putting in the proper forms and putting up the hundred dollar surety bond and bringing to the Liquor Commission an opportunity to protest a liquor license application. Both seem a bit unreasonable to me. Quite frankly, the citizens that have come to me do not want to see this barrier. They don't think it is fair. They don't see it as reasonable and I agree with them. I don't think it makes much sense. I also think that there are many other ways in which we can make it a lot easier for the citizens to express their opinion on these applications but I also realize that we have an important bill, LB 129, and that the liquor retailers do not like this amendment and that there are others that have talked to me that are not certain about its impact and so I am quite reluctant to put it up at this time. But I thought I ought to bring to your attention the problem, to bring to your attention a potential solution and tell you that perhaps that if you have a similar problem that I would be willing to work with you to do something about it. I think that we need to do something about it and I will certainly work toward that end next session but at this time I would ask the Speaker for permission to withdraw my amendment and proceed with the bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have nothing further on the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion is to advance 129. All in favor of that motion say aye, opposed no. Motion is carried. The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, with respect to the A bill, there is an amendment by Senator Warner, Mr. President, to the A bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, you may recall that 129 is the bill that increases the tax on certain alcoholic beverages and the funds would be appropriated as the A bill calls out but I raised the issue on I guess General File with the introducers if they would object if some portion of the additional funds could be utilized for an accelerated program relative to drinking drivers on the highways at this time and I don't know what their attitude is on the amendment now but what I am suggesting is that of the, I believe, billion seven or the million four that is raised that \$81,000 be appropriated for this year and this year only to the Department of Motor Vehicles Safety Program which currently has about a \$60,000 appropriation, but that \$81,000 of these additional funds be appropriated for the

purpose of highway safety programs to reduce the number of alcohol involved accidents with special emphasis on teenage drivers, and the amendment prohibits the use of any funds for any part time or permanent salaries. It is to be programs, the kind of activities that these funds would be used for and what they are used for now are in part some of the public relations type of approach, but in addition to that, they also assist in the purchasing of breath analyzers that are for law enforcement that are of a nature that will be more apt to stand up in court. They also carry on a number of educational programs of law enforcement officials to ensure that the arrest of an individual who is suspected of driving while intoxicated can be done in a fashion that will increase the probability of successful prosecution and I feel that while the program that is already in effect and where the bulk of the money goes is good for rehabilitation and it is for some activities for prevention, it seems to me a portion of these funds, arelatively small portion, is not unreasonable to be used for a direct program of preventive operation in terms of more better enforcement as well as calling attention to young folks particular where it seems to me there has been a number of alcohol related accidents, an increasing number, and I would hope the body would accept the amendment that would use \$81,000 for this year only. It would not come in as any continuation, it would come in as a new and expanded request next year, not a continuation budget. So I would move adoption of the amendment and I do not know what the introducers of the bill feel about it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol. We are speaking to the A bill, 129.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, in regard to Senator Warner's amendment, much as I would like to keep the money where it should be, recognizing the weight that Mr. Warner carries in this body, I yield to his wishes and suggest you support his amendment. The Department of Education is not ready yet, as I understand it, to handle this type of thing and the Motor Vehicles could and would and wishes to, so I would support his amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the Warner amendment to...Senator Warner, do you wish to speak to your amendment?

SENATOR WARNER: I just wanted to close and reluctantly acknowledge the logic of Senator Nichol's argument and I would like to pick a time or two later on for him to utilize it again. So with that I move adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Cullan, do you wish to speak before we close?

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I just rise to say I support the Warner amendment. I see no major problems with it. The one thing I wanted to clarify for the record is that LB 129 nor LB 129A do any earmarking of any sort. These programs come before the Appropriations Committee to be reviewed annually so there is absolutely no earmarking. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Warner amendment. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. The Warner amendment. Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 mays on the adoption of Senator Warner's amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The amendment is adopted. Now all those in favor of advancing the bill say aye, opposed no. Motion is carried. The bill is advanced. Next bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 118, I have nothing on the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion...Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker, I would like to report that the committee held a hearing on this bill today and there was no opposition, so we cleared that part, so I would like to say that there is no problem with this bill.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, you will recall this bill was the beer, wine and liquor bill that we passed a few days ago for specific reasons and the specific reasons were to fulfill a commitment that we made in 1978 when we changed the way we were handling alcoholism in the State of Nebraska. At that time we said we are not going to throw them in jail, fine them, keep them there a few days because they never can pay their fine anyway, turn them out to go do the same thing again. And the program has been working in some places. I wish you could have all gone with us about two or three weeks ago when we went to the north side of Lincoln to look at one of these places where they take people who are picked up on the street. Omaha has complained. Some of the other cities have complained we don't have a place to take them. We said we will try to get you a bill that will take the money from taxation of beer, wine and liquor to provide such facilities and to continue the programs that we have. You will recall a few days ago Senator Jerry Warner put an amendment on to use a portion of this money for a specific amount. That portion of the veto was less cut than the other portion which was really what the bill was about in the first place. I think we have a commitment. I think we should override this veto and use the money for which it was intended rather than to continue with the taxation as set out in the bill, 129, and put the money into the state coffers. I move for the return of the bill, and I move for the override of the Governor's veto.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. President and members, I support Senator Nichol in his effort. One of the things that I was involved in before I came to the Legislature was the programs that we have at the local level for alcoholism, mental retardation, mental health and the whole bit, and one of the things that I thought should happen, if we were going to continue with our alcohol program, or alcohol treatment program, was that that money should come from the liquor that is sold in the State of Nebraska. And we have done a lot of this over the years. We have added money nearly every year or every two years to the program of alcoholism control of some kind, treatment, whatever it might be. I think that is where it should be. When the bill passed a couple of years ago I knew we would have trouble outstate because we didn't have the facilities to take care of the drunks that you might find laying out on the street like you do here in Lincoln and Omaha and some of the larger cities. So I strongly support this. I have had a number of calls since noon and before noon with citizens concerned about this. They think that we should continue these programs and perhaps even increase them. And if the money is going to come from the alcohol that is sold. I think that is where it should come from. I think it should be distributed for these purposes. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kremer. All right. Any further discussion then on Senator Nichol's motion? Senator Nichol, you may close.

SENATOR NICHOL: We're just talking about the return, aren't we? I move for the return of the bill...or, no, I move for the override of the Governor's veto.

PRESIDENT: No, this is the motion that it becomes law notwithstanding the action of the Governor.

SENATOR NICHOL: That's right, that's what I am moving.

Mr. President, I have a motion from Senator Schmit that LB 322 become law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit on the motion that LB 322 become law notwithstanding the action of the Governor. Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, LB 322 was a bill which was enacted several days ago when I was absent. It was passed into law. It was refused to be signed by the Governor. The bill is a very simple bill but it does have in it the objections. The Governor objected to the bill because there was an amendment placed on the bill which provided that the Director of Agriculture did not have to sign

the certificates that need your signature regarding the overrides of LB 129A and LB 318. (See page 2426 of the Journal.)

PRESIDENT: All right, while the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I propose to sign and I do sign the certificates certifying passage of LB 129A notwithstanding the objections of the Governor, as well as to certify the passage of LB 318 notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.
