CLERK: Mr. President, LB 136 was offered by Senator Howard Peterson. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 13. It was referred to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Hefner, do you want to take the committee amendments?

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President, members of the body, I move the adoption of the committee amendments. But to explain the committee amendments, I think I should give you a little background on the bill and the original purpose of LB 136 as was introduced by Senator Peterson is to eliminate a statute which provides that the voters within a city, village or county may vote for or against allowing horse racing on Sundays within that community, if, if the State Racing Commission were to permit it. LB 136 establishes instead that the Racing Commission would approve an application for Sunday racing after it has considered certain criteria and, of course, what this would do is take away local control. And so the committee amended this bill and I will try to explain the committee amendment to you This amendment would provide for a countywide referendum vote and this could be held at any general state The committee felt election to allow Sunday horse racing. that since the local people voted to discontinue horse racing in Grand Island at Fonner Park, it would be only right to have the local people vote again at the general election whether to allow horse racing or whether not to allow horse racing. This amendment changes it to a countywide vote instead of just a city vote and I believe this brings the law into conformity with the rest of the

state. At the hearing, testimony was presented that Fonner Park in Grand Island provides much more service to the whole county than just horse racing in the city. It provides such things as the Hall County Fair and many other countywide activities. Now with the committee amendment, it gives all interested people a voice in saying whether Sunday horse racing should be allowed. I think it is fair. I think it is just and I think it is logical and so I, therefore, urge you to support the committee amendment and I move for its adoption.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President and colleagues, I would like to ask Senator Hefner several questions so that I am totally sure that I understand the committee amendments. Since Senator Schmit, Senator Fowler and myself are probably largely responsible for the legislation that you are attempting to change this year, I want to make sure that my original intent is being preserved. As I understand the amendments, Senator Hefner, the major change is that...there are two major changes. Number one, instead of the city voting, the county residents now vote as to whether or not there will or will not be Sunday racing, is that correct?

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Dworak, this is correct. At the present time, if the horse racing facility is located within the city limits, why then it is up to the city or village to vote.

SENATOR DWORAK: The second change is instead of a vote every four years, it now in effect will be every two years if they wish...the people either wish to put it on the ballot by petition or the Racing Commission wishes to put it on the ballot?

SENATOR HEFNER: This is correct. We are amending that statute that says "every general election" and so that would be every two years and I think the statute says now "every four years".

SENATOR DWORAK: And in those areas where the people have in fact spoken and have in fact said we do not desire Sunday racing, the only way there will be Sunday racing is for the people themselves to rescind their previous action by ballot?

SENATOR HEFNER: You certainly are correct, Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL PRESIDING

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp. The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? Shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. We are voting on whether or not to cease debate. Have you all voted? One more time, shall debate cease? Okay, record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 14 mays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Debate is ceased. Senator Hefner, can you take the committee amendments to....close on the committee amendments on LB 136?

SENATOR HEFNER: Yes, Mr. President, members of the body, I move the adoption of the committee amendment and what this does is leaves it up to the local people to vote on this on a countywide basis and it would be at a general election which would be every two years. Therefore, I move adoption of the committee amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of the adoption of the committee amendments to 136 vote aye, opposed vote no. The committee amendments as explained by Senator Hefner. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 3 mays on the adoption of the committee amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The committee amendment has been adopted. Senator Peterson, do you wish to be recognized to explain the bill?

SENATOR H. PETERSON: Mr. Chairman, I believe the bill as amended has been fairly well explained. What we are doing is two things: Number one, we are changing the opportunity for vote of the people from citywide to countywide and I think Senator Hefner explained the county fair is held at this particular location. In fact, it is the county fair, number one. Number two, Fonner Park is actually owned and operated by the Hall County Livestock Improvement Association which is a Hall Countywide organization. Number three, the rural people who are involved with 4-H Club work for most of the 4-H showing, all this kind of thing, the state dairy show and so forth held at this park, did not have an opportunity to vote. So I think it is rather logical for us to take this amendment and adopt it and adopt the whole bill. The other thing that is provided for in the bill that wasn't provided for before and is a subject of a lawsuit on the part of Fonner Park at the moment is there was no criterion in the bill for the basis on which the Commission

would make a decision and this bill does provide for criterion so that the Racing Commission will have to follow that criterion in determining whether or not Sunday racing should even be voted on. I would move the bill from General File to E & R.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I rise in support of LB 136. I believe that Senator Dworak pointed out that it is important to the entire State of Nebraska that the thoroughbred industry remain active and viable throughout the State of Nebraska. Without this kind of an option, it would be very difficult for the small operations to continue to sustain themselves. I want to support Senator Peterson's bill and ask you to support it also.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Peterson, do you wish to close on the advancement of the bill? Okay. All those in favor of advancing the bill to E & R for Review vote aye, opposed vote no. LB 136. Record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 6 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced.
