SPEAKER MARVEL: I think, Mr. President, the first thing we need to note is the fact that we are using valuable time that we may wish we had at the end of this session. I guess I am going to repeat this every day for a while and so would you please put on the Clerk's desk whatever legislation you have so that we can once again begin processing this legislation which means that the Exec Board needs to meet and refer the bills as soon as they have been processed by the Clerk and, therefore, I remind you first of all, get the bills in and, secondly, that the Exec Board then will have to meet to refer the bills. Now this process has to go on even if we may only meet until noon. Now, Mr. President, is that the... Pat, is there anything else to say about the reference of bills?

as you well know, we have various classes of cities and we pass laws which affect one class of city, do not affect another class of city. We have various classifications of counties. We pass laws that affect one classification of county, do not affect another. We have the same situation in school districts. We have several classes of school districts and that is...we have many different laws which affect different school districts differently. So we are not charting new ground. We are doing what we have been doing all the time and I think it is justified because there are different situations in different areas and they should be treated differently. Now these classifications are not perfect but they are an attempt by the Legislature to deal with the differences in the various areas of the state. I think they do a fairly good job and I think we should continue to take into consideration the different conditions in these different areas. I might call to your attention the fact that the State School Boards Association supported this bill and the real issue is this: Should the state mandate programs without providing the money to fund them? I say that they should not. I say that this bill should be advanced and I ask you to vote in support of it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of LB 165 to E & R for review. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? We are voting on the advancement of the bill. Record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 13 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. Are you ready for the next bill?

CLERK: Yes, sir. May I read some things first?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes. The Clerk has some items on the desk and then we will go to 178.

CLERK: Mr. President, a few items, a new resolution, LR 12 by Senator Wesely. (Read LR 12 as found on pages 388-389 of the Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over, Mr. President.

Mr. President, your committee on Miscellaneous Subjects whose chairman is Senator Hefner to whom is referred LB 27 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File; LB 82 to General File, (signed) Senator Hefner.

amendments are adopted. Now, Senator Johnson, what would you like to do with the bill?

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: I would like to move the bill, Mr. Speaker. In explaining the amendments, I have virtually explained the bill. The only additional factor of the bill that I didn't explain was that we specifically by the bill would say that the revisor of regulations is not an agency within the meaning of the Administrative Procedures Act so that the revisor of regulations may commence the recodification process without going through a public hearing every time there is a recodification done. Our Attorney General has given us an opinion that without this type of a change the revisor of regulations may literally be compelled to hold public hearings every time she changes some numbering system in the regulations itself and it seemed to us that that was silly and a waste of time, publication costs and the like, but by and large the bill does, as I have indicated earlier, it authorizes the revisor to begin the codification process, the indexing process and ultimately a computerization process for our administrative rules and regulations. It directs administrative agencies to get the codification process in order within the next two years and it makes the revisor of regulations at least not directly subject to the requirements of the Administrative Procedures Act. At this time I would move the advancement of this bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance LB 130 as amended to E & R for review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. The next bill, LB 27.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 27 was offered by Senator Shirley Marsh. (Read title.) It was first read on January 8, referred to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee for public hearing. It was advanced to General File. I have no amendments pending, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is the very shortest bill I have ever offered in the Legislature. It is two lines and one word long simply stating that the white-tailed deer, *Odocoileus virginianus*, is hereby adopted as the official state mammal. I wish all of you could have

been present the day of the public hearing before the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee. Several school classes, representatives from several school classes were there to watch the proceedings. Three of the students presented testimony to the committee. Their research had been involved since last fall. Nebraska is one of, I believe, seven states which has not yet designated a state mammal. As you are aware, a state mammal would lead to all kinds of interesting things for tourists. If you are interested in seeing the white-tailed deer, this is an example of an article which could be sold in our state representing our state's mammal which would be of value to tourists, something interesting to take home, something the children would love. As you know, the white-tailed deer is not only the most graceful and the sleekest of the deer family but it is a native to Nebraska. It is found in all ninety-three counties of Nebraska. It has traditionally provided food, sewing instruments, tools for the Indians. It continues to provide food and other leather goods for citizens of our state. I urge you to join with me in supporting the advancement of LB 27.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Rumery.

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I would like to ask Senator Marsh a question or two if I might. Senator Marsh, as I understand it the Legislature many years ago designated the State of Nebraska as the Beef State. Would this bill conflict in any way with that previous law?

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you for asking, Senator Rumery. No, it would not take away from what the action has already been for we continue to be the Beef State but this would designate a special category of state mammals. We have a state bird, state tree, state grasses, state rock, state gemstone and this would add to that very fine collection.

SENATOR RUMERY: Also a state insect.

SENATOR MARSH: Yes, sir. Thank you. State soil.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely, we are speaking to the bill as a whole.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I would rise in support of the bill. Originally I must confess, I had thoughts of offering an amendment to change the designation of the state mammal from the white-tailed deer to the cow. My feeling was that there is no mammal in the State of Nebraska that has done more for economy

and lifted the state higher than the cattle that we have raised and profited from, however, my feeling at this time is that Shirley had a pretty rough day yesterday. We have got a bill before us that is important to a lot of young people in the City of Lincoln and across the state and I think that we should advance the bill as it is and consider no other amendments and support this. Senator Schmit talks about bills that don't help anybody or hurt anybody or cost any money but quite frankly, this bill if it isn't passed would hurt some very young people's hearts and I think that to break those hearts would be a mean and cruel thing. So I certainly support the bill. We will be able to call Nebraska, "deer" Old Nebraska.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. President and members, I think Senator Wesely has just really crystallized my thinking on this. Are we going to eliminate the white-tailed deer from the hunting quotas that we have in the state then? It would be terrible to shoot one of those things, wouldn't it, if it is going to break all the kids hearts in Lincoln? And I'll tell you what, if they are not harvested they are going to overrun us poor suckers out on the farm that put up our hay and you know what happened a couple of years ago up in the Sandhills when they had to buy hay. I don't know how many were white-tailed and how many were the other varieties of deer that we have but I think we better use a little rationale and not be subject to some sixth grade kids in school on a decision like this. I admire those kids but they haven't had the whole story and I would like to have some of the other people from outstate that put up with these wild animals. I love the white-tailed deer too but the next thing you are going to do, you are going to eliminate them from the hunting privileges and we could be overrun with them rather than an asset, they would certainly be a liability. I think we better think about this before we do it and for one thing, I want it on the record to show that there are others that feel we could be getting ourselves into some trouble. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee held a hearing on this bill and there were like Senator Marsh said, I believe, three students that testified and these students did an excellent job. They had done their homework well and, Senator Kahle, are you listening? We brought this up, in fact, I think I asked the question. Okay, what do

about the hunting season on deer and the children understood this real well, that these animals need to be hunted so that they would not overpopulate and like I said before, I was real surprised that these sixth grade students knew so much about the white-tailed deer. We have a state flower. We have a state bird. We have a state rock and so I think adding one more to this collection would be real good. I think that the white-tailed deer is a beautiful animal and I know it was brought out at the committee hearing that maybe we should designate some other animal as a state mammal but in the end the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee felt the white-tailed deer was the best possible choice we could make and it was advanced to General File by unanimous vote. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President, members, I feel compelled to say a few words on this bill. I have no intention of attempting to damage Senator Marsh's attempt to bring to the attention of the people of the State of Nebraska a very beautiful and, I consider, a pretty animal but as Senator Kahle pointed out, I think also as a matter of the record that needs to be pointed out that there would be some danger if in the future somebody should decide that this particular mammal should be removed from the game list. I, for one, have quite a herd of deer that live on our place and they can be destructive. They can be very destructive, not only to grain fields such as milo or corn. They are living on my wheat this winter. I wouldn't pasture that wheat as dry as it is with cattle but the deer are living on it anyhow. We also had an outbreak of leptospirosis a few years ago in our cattle and the veterinarians seemed to think it probably was brought into the area by deer so there is some damage, a considerable amount of damage that can be done by these beautiful animals. I would hasten to add that I am not a hunter. All I do is raise them and, therefore, I have nothing against honoring these animals simply because of the fact they are a beautiful animal but again for the record I would be adamantly opposed to protecting these beautiful animals to the extent that they could seriously damage the livestock industry of this state. I would like to ask Senator Marsh one question if I may, if she would yield.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Marsh, do you yield?

SENATOR MARSH: I do yield.

SENATOR VICKERS: Senator Marsh, as I have indicated we do have a considerable amount of deer out there in greater

Nebraska if you will and very rarely, if ever, do we see very many white-tailed deer. There are a few. The majority of the deer that I was just describing are mule deer. I was just curious as to if we are going to honor a beautiful animal in this manner and an animal that undoubtedly must be pretty abundant in the State of Nebraska, why you chose the white-tailed deer instead of the mule deer?

SENATOR MARSH: For very specific reasons. Numerically according to the Game and Parks Commission there are more white-tailed deer in the State of Nebraska and the white-tailed deer are found in each of the ninety-three counties of the State of Nebraska and mule deer are not found in all of the counties of Nebraska according to the Game and Parks Commission who is my source of information, sir.

SENATOR VICKERS: Okay, thank you, Senator Marsh. That was for a point of information for myself. I appreciate that. I'm not sure I agree with the Game and Parks count but perhaps they are correct. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the previous question. Do I see five hands? All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 3 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Debate is ceased. Senator Marsh, do you wish to close on your motion?

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate the questions raised on the floor of the Legislature and I would like to speak specifically to Senator Kahle. The Game and Parks Commission made it very clear. The students who were supporting the bill made it very clear that they were aware that population control by hunting is a very necessary part of the health of the animal as a species as well as control of damage from overpopulation. The Game and Parks Commission has the authority to lengthen or shorten the hunting season so that they have a tool for control for the numbers of deer which are taken in any one season. With that safeguard and with the multitude of pounds of meat which the hunting provides as a food to the people of Nebraska I urge your advancement of LB 27.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

He has agreed to grant this but in order to do this we have to go through the legislative process so what I am doing is asking for an easement for the City of York to build a highway by the armory and I ask for the adoption of this bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President, members of the body, I just rise in support of this bill. The Miscellaneous Subjects Committee heard the bill and we feel the need is great. I believe the mayor of York presented his side to it and what this does, it grants an easement to the City of York so that they can build this street that is badly needed alongside the armory and I would urge your support for this bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Sieck, just a question if I may. I'm sure this is a good bill but I would just be interested in what the deficiencies are in the present law that prohibits the Adjutant General from having the kind of flexibility that is needed in this case and I am sure will be needed from time to time in other cases in other cities. I guess I am interested in why the bill is so narrowly drafted and why it doesn't perhaps deal with the problem of giving a broader authority to the Adjutant General if he does not have that kind of authority to deal with specific situations such as the present one.

SENATOR SIECK: Senator Beutler, I thought of the same thing. I thought it is kind of ridiculous to come here every time we need to do something which I did last year
