SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, LB 316.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 316 (read title). The bill was first read on January 19, referred to the Education Committee for hearing, advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Committee amendments, Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I ask for the adoption of the committee amendments and then I'll explain it briefly.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the committee amendments to LB 316. All those in favor of those amendments vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch, do you wish to explain the bill?

SENATOR KOCH: This bill is the result of a committee interim study on transportation, State of Nebraska, and originally we had in the bill an index system for transportation. Originally the bill was to make transportation uniform across the state because you know there is certain class of schools that do not have the same statute in terms of transporting students. The committee was unable to come to an agreement so these are the sections that we are striking by the adoption of this committee. What the bill does now is to primarily bring us into compliance with the federal law as it relates to transportation for students and that has to be done, and those are federal standards, that is number one part of the bill. Number two part of the bill, we used to pay on fraction of miles. As recommended to us by the Department of Education we should go away from that and that we would put the figure at 3, and anything above that would be one more mile to 4, and you get away from the fractional mile business and that affects no one except schools and they have no opposition to this. And the third thing it does is to bring to the...well, explanation of transporting one time. It is the actual miles you get paid. There have been obviously some people who have taken advantage of our law and have been receiving money that possibly was not due to them and so we clarified that and simply state that you have to demonstrate you have actually traveled that distance one way and that is all you are going to get paid for and that is the bill

and I ask for the adoption of the bill and the advancement to E & R Initial.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

It is clearly a carcinogenic and one of the more dangerous carcinogens in the country, in the world. As a matter of fact, we were going to do a research project and found it to be so dangerous we decided it wasn't safe enough to have here at the Eppley Institute so it is a very dangerous substance. 

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I will be quick about this but it is one of the things I wanted to bring up because I think my original idea was to file a kill motion on the bill but I would at least like to amend it to make the sending out of this information by the Department of Agriculture at...to be done only if the newspapers request the information. The reason that I am bringing this small bill up is because I think that although it is a small bill it involves a new principle that I don't think we want to get into the business of enacting. It is requiring the Department of Agriculture to send out on a monthly basis to each newspaper in the state certain information about a certain subject. Now we have required in our law in the past that certain agencies compile certain types of information and make it available, but to my knowledge, I don't know of anywhere in the law that we have to date required that a department send out information on a monthly basis to every newspaper in the state. And there are two hundred and some newspapers in the state and we are having this information compiled and sent out on a monthly basis, regular basis, and we don't even know how many of those newspapers will even bother to print it. So we are getting into the business of printing information that somebody may or may not use and which is being sent to over two hundred different places. This is a cost to government and the benefit of it is dubious at best I think and the precedent of starting this type of procedure I think is something we should be very careful about and obviously we could get into many agencies putting out many different kinds of information that different ones of us are interested in and increasing the cost of government significantly for a purpose that I don't really think is a legitimate purpose of government. But rather than asking you to kill the bill, all I am asking you to do is to allow the Department of Agriculture to do it when a newspaper request that it be done, when they want the information, and not necessarily sending that information out mandatorily every month whether they want it or not, but let's see if Mikey likes it first. Thank you.

So there is no need arguing or trying to explain it. It pertains to the same thing but it just says where private or individual funds have been contributed. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I was going to ask if this wasn't a reconsideration but Senator Haberman has just conceded that it is the same thing, it is a reconsideration, so I believe the motion is out of order and should be so ruled. He admitted it was a

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well the usual procedure I believe is to read those who have voted aye and those who have voted nay. As I understand, Senator Warner indicated that he had voted aye and he is not recorded as having voted and I would like to have the record read as we usually do.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Mr. Clerk, do you have the record?

CLERK: Mr. President, the vote on the advancement of 243 was as follows: (Read record vote again as found on page 2224 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner, for what purpose do you arise?

PRESIDENT: LB 360 passes and that will conclude Final Reading for today. Do you have any matters to read in, Mr. Clerk, at this point?

CLERK: Very quickly, Mr. President, I have two Attorney General's Opinions, the first addressed to Senator Beutler regarding LB 352, and one to Senator Howard Peterson on LB 512. Both will be inserted in the Journal. (See pages 2250 through 2253 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, I have a letter from the Governor addressed to the Clerk. (Read letter regarding LBs 477, 477A and 316 as found on page 2254 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: We are ready then, Mr. Clerk, for General File. Thirty minute limit. Mr. Speaker, do you want to say anything at this time about the limits on General File and General File position. I recognize Speaker Marvel.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I think that this is to encourage people to understand that we are practically down to the end of the line and that they should treat things accordingly. That's....in other words, we can't force that issue but we can encourage it.

PRESIDENT: All right, we are ready then, Mr. Clerk, for LB 448.

CLERK: LB 448 was introduced by the Performance Review and Audit Committee and signed by its members. (Read title.) The bill was originally read on January 20 of this year. At that time it was referred to the Public Health and Welfare Committee for hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President. There are committee amendments pending.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, first of all I guess I would not believe that this is a piece of legislation that has to be enacted in this session of the Legislature and I was quite surprised to see that the bill was place on the agenda. I personally would hope that we would simply pass over the bill until next year, and I guess at this point in time I would simply offer....well, I guess we will process it and see. But I really see absolutely no reason to process LB 448 in this session of the Legislature. But I should address at this point in time what the committee amendments do. The committee amendments to the bill delete the 16 hours of
