As you know, irrigation wells have had the requirement that they be registered for some time. It has been indicated that it would be helpful in knowing more about the total water situation if municipals were also required to register their wells. As Senator Kremer indicated, they do currently pay a fee so that the fee part of it is not changed, merely would require the registration so that somebody knows where they are. I move advancement of the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kahle, do you wish to speak on 246?

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker and members, a question of Senator Lamb, perhaps. I think I found it in the bill but they would still have the same distance stipulation that the farmer has, 600 feet I believe, or 660 feet from an existing well?

SENATOR LAMB: No change in the existing statute. I am not sure whether it is 660. I thought in the case of munies it might be a 1000. But whatever the statute is at the present it is not changed. We are only trying to get the wells registered so the Conservation Survey Division, Department of Water Resources and other entities have that information.

SENATOR KAHLE: Okay, so whatever the distance might be, or is, then the statute would be the same for the city as it would be for the farmer?

SENATOR LAMB: No, it would be the same as what it is now. I am not sure if it is the same, it's not changed is the only thing I am saying.

SENATOR KAHLE: Okay, thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 mays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. The next bill is 325.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 325 was introduced by the

Public Works Committee. (Read title.) It was first read on January 19, referred to the Public Works Committee. It was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman and members, LB 325 is a bill that came out of the Public Works Committee, and I think I should explain the bill and it would be easier to understand the amendment to the bill. At the present time when a Natural Resource District goes under control, before a well could be drilled it would require a permit. In the past wells have been drilled when under control without a permit. Consequently, this Legislature passed legislation that will provide for a late permit, and that should not continue. Therefore, the committee saw fit to introduce this legislation that would require that the well driller, before commencing the drilling of a well, shall have information verifying the fact that he does have a permit. All the well driller has to do to this proposed well owner is to say, I want to see your permit before I drill this well. That is the content of the bill. It was supported by the well driller. The well driller does not have to get the permit. He merely has to say, I want to see the permit or I want to be sure that you have one. And if the well driller does not do this, he is subject to a Class V misdemeanor. The amendment to the pill now merely shifts some of the responsibility onto the well owner, saying if he gives false information, or says that he does have a permit when he does not, he, too, is subject to a penalty. That, Mr. Chairman, is the amendment. So I move first of all for the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the committee amendment to LB 325. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 mays on adoption of the committee amendments, Mr. President.
