CLERK: Mr. President, your committee on Public Works whose Chairman is Senator Kremer reports LB 132 to General File with amendments; Mr. President, LB 361 to General File with amendments. Those are both signed by Senator Kremer as Chair.

Mr. President, new resolution, LR 32 by Senator Hefner. (Read. See pages 829 and 830, Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over, Mr. President.

Mr. President, Senator Chambers moves that LB 206 and 206A become law notwithstanding the objection of the Governor. That will be laid over as well.

PRESIDENT: We are ready then for agenda item #7, General File. The first bill on General File is LB 190. Mr. Clerk, will you read?

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SPEAKER MARVEL: No objection, so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Koch to print amendments to LB 311; Senator Wesely to LB 361; Senator Koch to LB 245; Senator Chambers to LB 273; Senator Newell to LB 47 and Senator Koch and Burrows to LB 190. (See pages 997-1002 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, Senator Kilgarin offers explanation of vote. Finally, Mr. President, two new resolutions, LR 43 by Senator Marvel as Speaker: (Read.) That will be laid over. LR 44 by Senator Koch: (Read. See pages 1002-1003.) That too will be laid over, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Now before we proceed to LR 26 which is on the agenda, today is the celebration of Agriculture Day. There will be a signing of a proclamation in the rotunda and the members of the Legislature are invited. The celebration begins around eleven-thirty and I assume those of you who want can check on the rotunda. Meanwhile we will continue with LR 26.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 26 is found on page 673 of the Journal. It is offered by the Public Works Committee and signed by its members. (Read.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, LR 26 was brought to the Public Works Committee by some of the subdivisions of government in the southwestern part of the state, namely tri-county interests and some of the NRDs in that area of the state. The resolution was signed by a number of the members of the Public Works Committee and then was held up for several days in order to learn if we could, how this project would be of benefit to Nebraska and if there were any disadvantages, what they would be. You have heard the resolution read and I have had the Pages lay a map on your desk, on each one of your desks, to show you where this proposed project is as related to Nebraska. You will note on the map that the dam would be close to Ft. Morgan, Colorado, and it would provide irrigation waters on and along the South Platte River almost to or to the Nebraska state line. Now I am trying to explain to you what the advantage would be to the State of Nebraska. I would like to make five important points why I think Nebraska should support this resolution. Some ask the question, why should Nebraska get involved in a project that is not in the state itself and it is a good question and I will try to answer that as I make these several points. First of all, if Nebraska does take a positive action on the

CLERK: 17 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the Vickers amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the amendment is adopted. Motion is carried, the amendment is adopted. Okay, all right, we need to adopt the committee amendments as amended. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Okay, there are two minutes left on the bill. If you wish to vote for the bill....have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of the committee amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the committee amendments are adopted. The motion is carried, the committee amendments are adopted. Okay, the motion now is to advance the bill. Do you so move? Okay, all those in favor of advancing the bill to E & R for Review vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion is carried. The bill is advanced. Before we get into the next bill, may I introduce guests of Senator Warner in the back of the Chamber, Mrs. John Scott and grandson, Eric. The Scotts visited the Unicameral January 24th, 1969 when Eric was 2 months old. Would you indicate where you are so we may welcome you? Okay. From Senator Kremer's District, forty-one students, 7th and 8th Grade, Silver Creek Public School, Silver Creek, Nebraska. Larry Meyer is the teacher, and there are two adults. And will you hold up your hands? You should be in the north balcony some place. Welcome to the Unicameral. Okay, LB 361.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 361 introduced by Senator Warner. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 19, referred to Public Works. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Mr. President, by the Public Works Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, the Public Works Committee did hear this bill and did consider

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the matter. They found a number of things that needed to be changed in the bill. First off, the bill as introduced would have covered all plates that were special that were owned in the state, and that wasn't really the intent of the bill. The intent of the bill was to deal with those that were tax exempt, and so the changes in the committee amendments would limit the focus to only two subsections of the statutes which deal with tax exempt cars in the state. So that would be the ones that would be covered instead of everybody have a special plate. And then secondly, instead of having a big E on the license plate, it would just say, tax exempt below the number. So that is the changes and I think they make the bill a much more workable one.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion is the adoption of the committee amendments to 361. All those in favor of that motion, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the committee amendments.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner, do you want to explain the bill?

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move that 361 be advanced and I think the committee amendment as Senator Wesely pointed out was...in essence was the bill and it merely is to make more identifiable those plates which are given to vehicles which are tax exempt from the personal property tax. They do pay a license fee. And the bill was brought to me, it was a request of the Lancaster County Commissioners. I understand that some other amendments are proposed, so....but as the bill stands I would move that it be advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, I now have an amendment offered by Senator Wesely, found on page 998 of the Journal.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this amendment has been one which I worked quite a bit on and have gained the support of a number of individuals and organizations in the state for. This amendment found on page 998 would essentially just add two words to the statute and that would deal with the section which allows for auto shows, or I should just say sport shows. And presently you can have motorcycles and motor homes and other types of vehicles like that, except you can't have a car, an automobile, and the whole thing...I don't know exactly why that is in there now but it has caused some problems, and in the City of Lincoln a constituent of mine, Pat Egan, has a sport show

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that he would dearly love to have automobiles to be allowed to be shown as well. And I know Senator Peterson has a car dealer in Grand Island which would like to do the same thing, and for some reason the statute is in there with this exemption. So I went to the Motor Vehicle Licensing Board and talked to them and they have a letter which I passed out unanimously in favor of this amendment. I talked to the Motor Carriers who have strongly supported this change and the New Car Dealers have a letter which I have distributed in favor of this change. And essentially what we are trying to do here is just allow a chance for these sport shows to have cars where people can come and take a look at them and compare the different cars and make a choice, and if they want to, purchase one. And I think in our present sagging economic state where our car sales are down so much, this could be a little shot in the arm to revitalize the auto industry in the state and perhaps do a real good service for the consumer by giving them a chance to compare cars and also help the car dealer by giving them a chance to sell some cars. So I think it is a very well supported amendment and urge your adoption.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Peterson, do you wish to speak to the Wesely amendment?

SENATOR H. PETERSON: Mr. Chairman, I would just say that I heartily endorse this amendment. I do have correspondence from the people in Grand Island that they have planned an energy show in June, and one of the things they found was that if they were going to let the automobile people show any of their possible conservation in energy that they were breaking the present statute. And it seems to me that if we have devices that will improve energy consumption as far as cars are concerned, they certainly belong in an energy show. So I would certainly encourage the adoption of this amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hoagland, do you wish to speak to the Wesely amendment?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I wonder if Senator Wesely would yield to a question.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Sure.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Senator Wesely, I gather from your hand-outs here that before automobiles can be sold at these various events, they have got to receive licenses or permits

From the Motor Vehicle Industry Licensing Board?

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, that is correct.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: And one of these handouts makes a representation that the Motor Vehicle Industry Licensing Board is going to do a good job of being sure that the public is fully protected in terms of selling pitches that are going to be made at these fairs as people walk around to look at the displays and are suddenly confronted with an auto dealer that wants to sell them a car. Is that right?

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, they will be regulated by the Motor Vehicle Licensing Board.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Now is that the same Motor Vehicle Licensing Board that has 11 members, 10 of whom are franchise holders of one sort or another?

SENATOR WESELY: Possibly.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I don't have any further questions, Mr. Speaker. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, I would have a question of Senator Wesely. Are you saying that they may display these cars at these affairs, or they may sell them at these affairs?

SENATOR WESELY: Well, they can display them and I think the change also allows them at the time if desired they can sell them too, I think.

SENATOR NICHOL: Well, what would...where is there any law that would exclude them from selling them anywhere? They can sell them in church if they want to.

SENATOR WESELY: No, well, actually, this change, it's prohibited now from these sport shows to show a car and to...if they wanted to, close the deal on it at that time. I know it sounds hard to believe, Bill, but that's why we are trying to change it.

SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, I thought they had the right to sell a car any time and any place they wanted to.

SENATOR WESELY: No, huh uh.

SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, looks like we are going to make honest people out of them finally.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Are you going to handle it?

SENATOR WESELY: Okay. Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, the committee amendments to LB 417 do a number of things. They expand the concept behind LB 417 and allow for some problems that were brought to the committee's attention at the hearing. First off, we have a problem in Western Nebraska in the Panhandle on sugar beets being hauled to the market, and the problem is one that they are not really being able to use their trucks to get these stockpiles out in the field to the market. explanation, do you think we should work that concern out that you have on this bill on General File, Senator Wesely, rather than, you know, we were lamenting the fact that we are going onto Final Reading with so many of those bills and so much work has to be done and you indicated there are problems with this bill. There was concern with areas of this bill. Maybe we should address those right now.

SENATOR WESELY: Senator Dworak, let me explain. There has been one person who, in fact, testified in favor of the bill, Mary Hepburn O'Shea, who has expressed concern about the definition that we have in here. I think the definition is probably pretty good as it is, but to try and meet her concern, we are willing to sit down and spend some time with her. My feeling, quite frankly, is the bill if it is passed in its present form would be a perfectly good piece of legislation but, again, I am concerned. I don't want to unduly concern Mrs. O'Shea so I think Senator Johnson and I both are willing to talk to her but the bill has not got a problem I think. I think it is a good bill. We are just trying to recognize the fact that she has expressed an interest and we are willing to work with her.

SENATOR DWORAK: Thank you, Senator Wesely.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance 487 to E & R for Review. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. LB 316.

CLERK: Mr. President, if I may right before that, I have a new A bill, 396A, by Senator Carsten. (Read title.)

Senator Landis had amendments to LB 324 that he wishes to withdraw, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: A motion.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Hearing no objection, so ordered.

CLERK: And finally, Mr. President, Senator Wesely asks unanimous consent to have his name added to LB 361 as co-introducer.



Mr. President, your committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports they have carefully examined LB 184 and recommend that same be placed on Select File with amendments; LB 376 placed on Select File with amendments. Those are both signed by Senator Kilgarin as Chair.

Mr. President, LBs. 3, 11, 11A, 12, 70, 99, 146, 228, 250, 266, 266A, 296, 296A, 310, 328, 328A, 361, 366, and 369 are ready for your signature.

SPEAKER MARVEL: While the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I am about to sign and do sign LB 3, LB 11, LB 11A, LB 12, LB 70, LB 99, LB 146, LB 288, LB 250, LB 266, LB 266A, LB 296, LB 296A, LB 310, LB 328, LB 328A, LB 361, LB 366, LB 369. Okay, if we may have your attention, the first item will be from the Clerk's desk and the second item will be Senator Warner's. So, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a letter addressed to the membership from Senator Warner who is Chairman of the Appropriations Committee. (Read. See pages 2052 and 2053, Legislative Journal. Re: Line item vetoes of LB 561.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner, you are recognized to comment on the letter just read.

SENATOR WARNER: All right, Mr. President, again under the provision of the rule, the Appropriations Committee is to make such report, and as the report indicates, there was one item which the majority of the committee did support to offer a motion for override which at the time which will be designated by the Senator representing the majority of the committee's position on that issue. The other portion I might just go through briefly with you is the second and third page which is to give you for your information. Page two that is an analysis of the Governor's line item vetoes points out those vetoes that occurred relative to committee recommendations and it shows what the collective floor amendments were, and the last group indicates the vetoes that were relative to the floor amendments and shows the total dollar amount then of \$728 million to \$74,747 that would remain under the Governor's veto as the legislation now stands. If you look at page 3, headed Financial Status Summary, it is similar to what is on the back of the agenda but in a slightly different form. Above the line at the top it shows again the original committee level of recommendation in those bills. The next shows the allocation for A bills that was originally recommended, that subtotal, and then it shows the amount that was

SENATOR CHRONISTER: Yes, I urge the passage of LB 111, the advancement.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted?

SENATOR CHRONISTER: Mr. Chairman, I wonder if we could get the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hefner, can we get some potential votes from your group? We are hung up at the moment. This is to advance 111. Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 11 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion carried. The bill is advanced. What is the next bill? 138?

CLERK: Mr. President, if I may right before that, a communication from the Governor addressed to the Clerk. (Read communication regarding LB 361 as found on page 2151 of the Legislative Journal.)
