SENATOR PIRSCH: And then there was another sheet that said even if they tested further it could be up to eight thousand dollars if they ran all the tests. Is there anything in that bill which would limit those tests to those who...well how could you possibly know which ones you should test?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well very frankly, Senator, if the University does not have the money they would not have to do the testing.

SENATOR PIRSCH: But if they did not have the funds and they did not test, then this would not really be ...

CLERK: 26 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SENATOR NICHOL: LB 331 is advanced. We go go LB 392.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 392 was introduced by Senator Richard Marvel. (Read.) The bill was first read on January 20 of this year, referred to the Urban Affairs Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments by the Urban Affairs Committee, Mr. President.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Landis, did you want to take the committee amendments?

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, this is a meritorious bill introduced by Senator Marvel and as we all know, interest rates have gone up tremendously. The purpose of the bill was to remove the interest ceiling now in effect on revenue bonds issued by municipalities under the Off Street Parking Act. The current statutory limit is 7%. The bill as drafted simply took off any mention of a maximum interest rate. The committee in what I believe was a reasonable compromise reinstituted a maximum interest rate but that interest rate was 12%. To those people that appeared before us, the City of Norfolk, First MidAmerica and other bonds people as well as the letters that we could ascertain in context that we could ascertain, 12% would get them off the hook. They could easily float bonds at that rate and did not foresee any problem with that maximum. We did, however, want to impose a maximum since that is common statutorily that there be a maximum interest rate allowable on these kinds of bonds and, therefore, the committee raised from 7 to 12% by way of the committee amendments, the maximum interest rate on bonds used to provide the proceeds for off street parking under the Off Street Parking Act. I would move the adoption of the committee amendments.

SENATOR NICHOL: We are voting on the adoption of the committee amendments. All those in favor signify by voting aye, opposed nay. Record please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of committee amendments, Mr. President.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Marvel, did you wish to talk about the bill, please?

SENATOR MARVEL: As Senator Landis has indicated Hastings among other cities and as he indicated also, Kearney and Norfolk for example, are interested in off street parking facilities. It has been almost impossible to operate in this area with the present percentage. There was some discussion in the committee about what that percentage should be and I think the committee is to be commended for the way they have put the pieces together so it is a workable document and still allows some flexibility. So with those remarks I would move that the bill be advanced to E & R.

SENATOR NICHOL: The question is, shall LB 331 be advanced. All those in favor signify by voting aye, opposed nay. Excuse me, 392. Sorry.

That is not the issue before you right now. This amendment is strictly technical in nature. At one point in the amendments that were adopted, we changed and applied the need standard idea to a section of law with respect to the sale of homes purchased by VA benefits. However, that section of law is also mirrored with parallel language in the Constitution so that to amend the law would be for naught, that, in fact, the constitutional language has written, perpetually I guess until a vote of the people declares otherwise, that benefit or that special perquisite into our Constitution and we as a Legislature cannot change the terms of that benefit, therefore, the amendment that I have previously offered with that one respect would be ineffective and there was no reason to add that language to the law when, in fact, the Constitution restricts our options. I would urge the body to adopt this amendment because simply it takes out language which cannot be put into effect by the Legislature since it violates the Constitution and then as I understand it, we will be faced with the further policy decision after this motion of whether or not we want to strike the Landis-Peterson amendments, and so I hope we do not embroil this amendment with the issue that we will be faced with following the disposition of this amendment and for housekeeping purposes I would urge the adoption of 478 amendment offered at this time and then shortly we'll be debating the merits of the previously adopted Landis-Peterson amendments. So I hope that you will vote, at least in this case, and then we can set the stage for the debate on that policy choice just a little bit later.
