Your committee on Urban Affairs whose Chairman is Senator Landis reports 437 to General File with amendments. (Signed) Senator Landis.

Mr. President, LB 128 was introduced by Senator Myron Rumery. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 13 and referred to Retirement for public hearing. It was advanced to General File. I have no amendments on the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Rumery, do you wish to explain the bill?

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if I could have your attention for a few minutes, I would appreciate it. We introduced this bill for these reasons, that should a member of the school employee's retirement system die before retirement, LB 128 would provide an option for the payment of benefits to the spouse of the member, if the spouse is the sole surviving beneficiary. Presently the law provides that if a teacher has twenty years service and is at least 55 years of age or thirty years of service regardless of age and dies before retirement, a monthly annuity for life would be paid the spouse if the spouse is the sole surviving beneficiary in an amount equal to the joint and survivor benefit that would have been paid if the deceased member had retired on the date of death. The joint and survivor benefit is a greatly reduced benefit. The amount of the reduction is determined by the age of the deceased member and the age of the spouse. There are times when the surviving spouse would prefer to have a lump sum benefit rather than a meager monthly payment for life. Often a surviving spouse of a deceased member needs funds for retraining or to enter another job market or to invest in a business that may have some opportunity. LB 128 would give a spouse who is the sole surviving beneficiary

you hold your hands up so we can recognize you, please. Welcome to the Legislature. Senator Higgins, on the bill.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Mr. President, I will be brief so that others can be heard today. LB 87 is to improve procedures in the handling of intoxicated persons, both for the benefit of themselves and the community at large. The procedure would be changed to allow the removal of intoxicated persons from quasi public property as well as from public property and to require that intoxicated persons be taken into civil protected custody for up to, as amended by the committee, twenty-four hours. I urge the advancement of the body of LB 87. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any discussion on the advancement of LB 87. If not, all those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted on the advancement of LB 87? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SENATOR CLARK: The bill is advanced. We will take up LB 437.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 437 was offered by the Urban Affairs Committee and signed by its members. (Read.) The bill was read on January 20, referred to Urban Affairs. It was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments by the Urban Affairs Committee, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Is Senator Landis in the room? 437, the committee amendments on the bill.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, LB 437 is an Urban Affairs Committee bill. It is meant to more than clarify, change some provisions with respect to the implementation of speed ordinances for railroad trains in the cities of Nebraska. There are committee amendments. They are substantial in that they make it explicit that we are talking only about speed limitation ordinances. As originally drafted the bill applied to any ordinance which directly or indirectly affected the operations of an interstate railroad. That has been changed now to talk only about speed limit ordinances so that is a narrowing by the committee amendments and, secondly, rather than requiring a special hearing on the ordinance, LB 437 as amended by the committee amendments requires that railroads be apprised of the first reading of the proposed speed limitation ordinances. This means then that the committee amendments limit considerably the application of the section only to the instance of speed limitation ordinances and, secondly, it does away with the

requirement for any special extra hearing procedure but does require notice to the railroads of a speed limitation ordinance being given first hearing by the city council. I would move the adoption of the committee amendments.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any discussion on the committee amendments to LB 437? If not, all those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted on the committee amendments to LB 437?

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of committee amendments, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The committee amendments are adopted. On the bill itself, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: This is a committee bill, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. It was introduced in behalf of the railroads in the State of Nebraska brought to my by Phil Kenny and at the time of the hearing when we were looking at the green copy there was opposition by the League of Municipalities, however, as the bill has been amended I think we have substantially resolved all of the issues involved with this bill. The purpose, the net effect of LB 437 is to make sure that when a city is about to enact a speed limitation ordinance that railroads know that fact so that they can appear and testify. Oftentimes speed limitation ordinances are used as a way of getting the attention of the railroads for some related safety problem or a crossing problem or the contribution for some local projects and that kind of thing and the speed limitation ordinance is a sort of a double shuffle that cities will use to whack over the heads of the railroad, thereby getting the attention of the body so that they can make some other useful negotiation down the line. Well the difficulty is that this puts engineers, it puts the trains themselves into the problem of trying to comply with rules they don't even know exist. Railroads pass through villages and cities all the time and if there is constant fluctuation of those supposed speed limits you have the liabilities of the railroads and of course the engineers and that just creates for a very uncomfortable situation. Some of the most compelling testimony before the committee was from a member of the union of the engineers. They want to know the speed limits of the cities that they pass through. They do not want to be responsible

for an accident. They don't want to be in violation of the law. They want to comply. They don't want to have themselves on the hook for some accident and then find out later that they were breaking a speed limit ordinance that they had no knowledge of and the only way for them to know that is to be given adequate notice and that is what LB 437 does. It provides for adequate notice and it gives the railroads a chance to react to the passing of a speed limitation ordinance. I might close by saying this does not prohibit speed limit ordinances in any way. Cities are absolutely free to make speed limit ordinances as they wish but the bill does require the notification of railroads. I would urge the adoption by the body of LB 437.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the advancement of 437. Is there any discussion? If not, all those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SENATOR CLARK: The bill is advanced. The next bill is 379, Public Health.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 379 was introduced by the Public Health and Welfare Committee and signed by its members. (Read.) The bill was read on January 19. It was referred to Public Health and Welfare. It was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would just like to inform the Clerk that he butchered the word "nurse anesthetists" and let him go by but I butchered it for about the first twenty times I uttered the word too so I guess we will let him go. The committee amendments do primarily four things. They prohibit independent practice by nurse anesthetists. I believe that was already in the existing bill but we made it absolutely clear that nurse anesthetists cannot have an independent for fee practice. Secondly, we ensure that the schools of professional nursing or in other words, the diploma nursing schools are included in the definition of educational institutions because we did not want to exclude graduates of those diploma schools from engaging in the Nurse Practices Act and meeting requirements under this act. The third requirement requires consent of an anesthesiologist as well as consultation with an anesthesiologist in determining the care given to patients and the fourth is a ...

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the Unicameral, this is a very personal thing and I would like to have your attention, especially the attention of the press. In the Omaha World Herald and in the Star this morning, it says, "Senator Rex Haberman of Imperial who operates a liquor store". I do not operate a liquor store. I do not own a liquor store nor do I have any stock in any liquor stores. I do not know where this idea came from and I would like to inform this body and have it go on the record that I am in no way involved in any liquor stores, wholesale, retail, giveaway or anything else, and I thank you, Mr.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, I urge you to advance the bill. It is of course the money aspect of this thing and I would just say on Select File as Senator Cal Carsten pointed out, we have to decide on the numbers and that may be \$70,000,000. It may be \$71,000,000, 72.5, I don't know. But I think all of you people that feel very strongly one way or another, we should sit down here in the next twenty-four to forty-eight hours and see if we can't reach a consensus of just what kind of numbers you want to put in here.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the advancement of LB 284A. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Have you all voted on the advancement of 284A? Record the vote.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the A bill.

Mr. President, Senator Labeledz offers explanation of vote.

I have a new resolution signed by the membership, LR 50. (Read LR 50 as found on pages 1224-1225 of the Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over, Mr. President.

Mr. President, I have an Attorney General's opinion addressed to Senator Marsh. That will be inserted in the Journal. (See pages 1225-1226 of the Journal.)

Mr. President, Senator Cullan would like to print amendments to LB 437; Senator Wesely to print amendments to LB 181. (See page 1227 of the Journal.)

Mr. President, LB 40 was a bill introduced by Senators Goodrich, Koch and DeCamp. (Title read.) The bill was first read on January 8. It was referred to Revenue. The membership considered the bill on March 23. At that time committee amendments were adopted, Mr. President. On a motion the bill failed to advance on March 23. I now have an amendment from Senator DeCamp to strike the committee amendments as adopted.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the only reason I suggest we strike the committee amendments is because they proposed this be on the ballot as I understand it, in May in Omaha and that now is a technical and legal impossibility. So I am suggesting we strike those amendments and then I would hope that maybe in light of the

idea that LB 87 would make it to the floor this morning and I had instructed my aid to get these passed out much sooner and it just jumped up. But I would be willing to wait a reasonable amount of time for you to study the amendments, certainly.

SENATOR NICHOL: I think that we can have it down by tomorrow all right and I really don't think that we have a problem here but since it is going to E & R we would have to do it over again if there were slight punctuation or something. . .so if you would I would appreciate it.

SENATOR HIGGINS: I would be happy to do that Senator, since the bill came out of your committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Do you want the bill laid over until tomorrow or what?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Could we hold it till Wednesday? That will give you plenty of time to study it. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All right, lets finish the other two items and then we will recess. Mr. Clerk, 437.

CLERK: Senator Kilgarin, Senator.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kilgarin, do you want to . . . .

SENATOR KILGARIN: I move the E & R amendments to LB 437.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of that motion say aye, opposed no. The motion is carried, the E & R amendments are adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Cullan moves to amend the bill. His amendment is on page 1226 of the Journal.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the amendment which is printed on page 1226 and 1227 of the Journal indicates the language is important as is follows, "In any circumstances involving a railroad accident or the operation of the train in violation of state law or local ordinance, no engineer or other crew member of the train shall be required to furnish a motor vehicles operator's license to any state or local enforcement officer, or shall any citation involving the operation of a train be issued against the motor vehicle operator's license of the engineer or any other



crew member of the train." This particular amendment came to me from the railroad engineers association, Mr. Jim Moeller, who lobbies in their behalf. He indicated that sometimes these individuals if they are involved in an accident, this accident, and perhaps in some cases local police officers will give these individuals a citation. That eventually ends up on their driver's record and of course winds up affecting their insurance rates and so forth and an engineer driving or operating a train should not obviously. . . motor vehicle statutes are not intended to apply to this individual. So that is the purpose of the amendment and it comes to us simply from the railroad engineers. So I would urge you to adopt it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Cullan amendment to LB 437. Senator Cullan, will you turn your light off if you are through. Senator Wesely, are you through? Do you want to be recognized again? Senator Landis? Okay, Senator Landis, you go ahead and then we will come back to Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I support the Cullan amendment. I was apprised of it. This bill went through the Urban Affairs Committee. It deals with the speed limit ordinances that cities pass and the kind of notice that should be given to the railroads. This language is word-for-word language that appears in other state statutes, specifically Iowa, and it indicates that when there is a train-car accident, that the train's engineer not have some kind of citation that then counts against his driver's license for his motor vehicle. That is...it is just a clarification for that purpose. It is common in other states and I see no problem with attaching it to 437. I support the Cullan amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Landis, do you want to turn your light off. Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I also was apprised of this amendment and find it to be totally in need of support. It is a very good amendment and the situation that we now have is so silly, it is ludicrous, I think it is a good laugh when a situation comes up where a train engineer, the train speeds or something and he gets a personal ticket for that situation, it just doesn't make any sense at all. This amendment is certainly a wise one. I don't know how it got in the statutes in the first place.

Mr. President, Senator Warner as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee moves for the introduction of Request #931.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move the bill be introduced. This will be one of six bills that we will be requesting to have introduced. They will cover the general operations of state government, and if they are introduced, I then would ask to have them placed on General File as we normally do so they can be printed immediately. I also would point out that beginning tonight and tomorrow night and other times as requested we will be giving briefings for the members of the Legislature on the appropriations, and you will have a booklet in your offices sometime this afternoon which will summarize each of the agencies' requests and the Governor's, as well as the committee's recommendation for that request. SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, I move that we adjourn until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

SPEAKER MARVEL: We are in the middle of a vote, Senator Koch. Senator Beutler, everyone who is not excused.... everybody is here except Senator Chambers. Shall we proceed with the roll call?
