Senator Schmit, I have to close wiin this, you mentioned surplus of teachers. You had better look at the record today. There is not a surplus, only in a very few fields. In fact, there are shortages developing and by mid 1980's there are going to be very severe shortages for a number of reasons, and the Education Committee does not control the number of people who matriculate in a standing college. That is only controlled by the Regents and you know that. If you want to talk about surpluses, my figures show there are eight hundred and some veterinarians in this state and the veterinarians tell me that is a surplus. So let's get down to the issue. Is it Education or isn't it, and I request that the bill be rereferenced to the Education Committee. Thank you.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 124 offered by the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee and signed by its members. (Read title.) The bill was first read on January 13. It was referred to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are no amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I move to advance LB 124 to E & R Initial. This is a Miscellaneous Subjects Committee bill and this bill consists of four sections. The first section, if you are following along, establishes legislative intent in relation to liquor control. It also establishes that it is the Legislature's intent to control and regulate all liquor transported into the state with the same regulations affecting liquor produced within the state. The second section establishes conditions which must be met before a retail or a bottle club liquor license can be obtained from the Liquor Commission. An applicant must be fit, willing and able to provide the service proposed as described in the application. An applicant must conform to all provisions, requirements, rules and regulations. The premises for the proposed service are or will be required by present or future public convenience and necessity. February 27, 1981

SENATOR KAHLE: So it wouldn't affect the overall strength of the fund?

SENATOR RUMERY: No, no fiscal impact.

SENATOR KAHLE: Okay, thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance 128 to E & R for Review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 mays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, LB 462 was introduced by the Committee on behalf of the Retirement Systems Board and was developed by Ken Steinmiller staff for the Board. The Retirement Systems Board has been working with the Internal Revenue Service to try and get certain of the systems qualified. Those systems are the county, the judges, the State Patrol retirement systems. By IRS qualification, basically what it means is that the employer contribution would not be counted as income to the employee and this bill provides technical amendments to try and satisfy some of the concerns that the Internal Revenue System has developed out with regards to our retirement plans. Basically they are just technical amendments. They no way change the amount of benefits that anybody is receiving or contributions or affect the fiscal shape of the plan at all. They are just certain restrictions that IRS felt some kind of guidelines they wanted written into our retirement plan so that we could get a letter of qualification. I would be glad to go into greater depth if the people desire but, otherwise, I would just move to advance LB 462.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of the bill to E & R for Review. Those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on advancement of 462 to E & R for Review. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 mays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion is carried. The bill is advanced. I understand...Senator Newell, 176.

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President, members of the body, LB 176 is a bill that deals with unemployment compensation and because there are a number of other bills that it would impact, other bills it would impact, especially one that will have to be passed by this body, we need to prepare an amendment. That did not come to my attention until just recently and I was unable to do that and so I would ask Senator Maresh, who is the Chairman of the Labor Committee, if he has any problem with maybe allowing some additional time to try to work out the proposed amendments?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker, Senator Newell is correct. I think this bill should be held up to see what we do on a conformity bill and it would be premature to act on this now. I tried to hold the bill in committee but I was overruled and it was advanced so I am glad that Senator Newell wants to cooperate and see what happens on these other bills.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Can the two of you get together with whoever else is interested so that we can maybe visit about this on the first of the week, Monday?

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes.

SENATOR NEWELL: We will try to do that. The difficulty we have is the other bills coming along we have not prepared even the amendments necessary and so I will be working with Senator Maresh to try to work this out.
