CLERK: Mr. President, your committee on Appropriations whose Chairman is Senator Warner to whom was referred LB 604 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File and 604A advanced to General File with committee amendments attached. Your committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports that LB 435 is advanced to Select File with E & R amendments attached. (See pages 493 and 494 of the Legislative Journal).

Mr. President, Senators Chronister and Higgins ask unanimous consent to add their name to LB 882 as co-introducer.

PRESIDENT: Any objections? If not, so ordered. Ready then for the next bill on General File, Special Order by the Speaker, LB 589, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 589 offered by the Banking Committee and signed by its members. (Read title). The bill was read on January 6 of this year. It was referred to the Banking Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, last year the Legislature completely rewrote the limited partnership laws. The last time it had been done was 1916. When we did it, taking the advice...and I am not going to take the blame, taking the advice of some professors from different universities, we left out some things that had been put in in 1971 and '77. They were technical things and, quite frankly, quite minor, but they screwed up the operation of a couple of limited partnerships that were in existence and so we are re-instating that language and that is what this amounts to. It is a technical correction of the thing we left out last year and it is agreed to by everybody. The people that drafted the new law, the uniform law, agreed that these probably should have been left in, so what they have to do with, keeping records, for example, you don't have to keep physical records in the State of Nebraska if the limited partnership base is outside of the state, some things like that. I would move advancement.

Your Committee on Revenue whose Chairman is Senator Carsten reports LB 25 indefinitely postponed.

Mr. President, LB 604 introduced by Senators Cope, Rumery and Fowler. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 6, referred to Appropriations. The bill was advanced to General File. Mr. President, I have no amendments.

SENATOR CLARK: I would hope enough people would stay on the floor to complete this bill. Senator Cope.

SENATOR COPE: Yes, I hope so too. LB 604 provides, as the Clerk said, for the continuation of the Building Renewal Act. Now that may not mean a lot to you but when I say, 309, then your ears should come right out like, I know what you are talking about, and that is what it is. We are asking in this bill to continue the 309 bill that was passed 5 years ago and has done probably more for the State of Nebraska than most any bill that we have passed. There were no negative votes by the Appropriations Committee who heard the bill. And believe me it has been unanimously accepted by all the agencies that have taken advantage of 309 money. I sent a questionnaire out in the fall asking what they thought about it, should it be continued? And the answers were magnificent, believe me. At the hearing, I heard, we heard, the people who testified said that the buildings in the State of Nebraska are in better shape than they have been in the last 30 years that they had served in the various agencies. It has done a tremendous job. I won't reiterate a lot of the things that were done but one I think that you should listen to and listen to good. There have been 800 roofs that either have been replaced or done a substantial repair on. That, in itself, is something. There are many,

many more, but the time is short. I would like to tell you some of the other things that they are doing. One is, for the first time in the history of the state we know how many buildings we have, we know the condition they are, we know what they are used for, and everything that should be known about the buildings. They are now on computer and we are running the State of Nebraska and the over a billion dollars worth of buildings like a business, and I think that is good. This primarily has been preventive maintenance, getting the buildings up in shape. There has also been a lot of energy saving because when a new roof goes on, there is insulation put with this roof and the thousands and millions of dollars that have been saved in energy is great. We have been able to match federal funds for energy saving when this takes place. Last year alone there were \$700,000 in federal funds used because we had the money available to cooperate with the federal government. The most important parts of 309 is the functions of the Task Force. No monies are allocated until an onsite inspection and report is made by the Task Force. Training seminars for state employees on boiler operations, water treatment, general roof maintenance, and these things, are given regularly. We know how now to take care of the buildings and the machinery, the whole bit that the state owns. I am going to offer an amendment on Select File to delete one little portion that the University of Nebraska asked us and that is to take out that it could be used for air conditioning and heating. We don't need that, and that certainly will be deleted. I am sure that....

SENATOR CLARK: You have one minute left.

SENATOR COPE: One minute? I would like to say this, the Capitol is one of the best examples of 309 funds. Now there has been other funds used, but 309 has...there is a lot of, and I say millions of dollars gone into the Capitol Building and you see what it is. I hope you take this seriously. I hope we have a unanimous vote on the floor to continue 604 which means 309 for another three years.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, Senator Cope just answered one of my two questions in indicating that the air conditioning provision will be eliminated on Select File. The second question I have and it really is a question, Senator Cope, if you

could respond. The bill has some new language providing that the Task Force, and I take it this is the 309 Task Force, shall review all contracts for services with private...from private enterprises, that is I guess in certain situations you can contract with private entities to get certain kinds of work done, as I understand it.

SENATOR COPE: Correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And my question is simply this, shall review it. Does that mean they have the power to approve or disapprove? Or does that simply mean they have to sign off as having approved, or as having reviewed the proposition?

SENATOR COPE: I am sure it is that they have reviewed the situation, but I will check to be positive of that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, I would just like clarification on that item.

SENATOR COPE: All right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Wesely, your light is on. Senator Rumery's light is on, I am sorry.

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, Senator Cope mentioned the Capitol Building is one that has come under the benefit of this effort. The first year I was here I looked up at the south wall and saw the water stains that had been allowed to be generated because of windows leaked. The promenade around the building was leaking and acted as a funnel and poured water in on the offices of the first floor. And Mr. Ken Fugeron, the Building Director, has informed me that as far as they know all leaks in the State Capitol Building have been taken care of and that...I know, they took me up there and I observed several acres of copper roof that had been replaced, and you have noticed, of course, the work that has been done on the outside of the building and we now have a building of which we can be at least partially proud and I think that when we get through, you will be completely proud of it. I urge your support for the bill.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Vard Johnson. You have got about two minutes.
