SENATOR LAMB: As I recall from the committee hearing, one of the administrators indicated that there would be some problems that they would have in administering this. Can you refresh my memory on that?

SENATOR WIITALA: No, I really can't. The only thing I can remember is Senator Sieck's suggestion. He wanted to include some other school systems that were...or some homes for children that would bring tuition into school districts and he decided to introduce a bill on his own volition next year that would address that issue.

SENATOR LAMB: It seemed to me that the one superintendent suggested it might be a problem for the school to determine the situation between parents. I guess I am not too clear on that but whether or not in fact this child was the child of the person with whom the child is living. I guess I am not going to strenuously object to the bill but I think maybe on Select File we should investigate that a little more and discuss it. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill as per Senator Wiitala's discussion. All those in favor of advancing the bill vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: LB 678 offered by Senator Hefner. (Read title.) The bill was first read on January 7 of this year, referred to the

Agriculture and Environment Committee for hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President. Senator Hefner has an amendment to the bill. Senator Hefner's amendment is found on page 993 of the Journal, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, first I would like to explain the bill to you and then I will get into the amendment, if that is okay with the Speaker. This bill, LB 678, is a housekeeping bill to clean up one of the statutes regarding bulk sales of commodities within the state. During my research I found that the original purpose of this statute that was on the book was to safeguard the consumer from coal dealers when coal was a predominate heat in our state. The statute required that each sale in excess of \$20 must be accompanied by a delivery ticket stating the grade, the cost per unit, total weight measured or purchased and from whom it was purchased. However, gasoline has now reached a point where it is not too uncommon to exceed the \$20 limit when filling one's auto with gaso-Furthermore, state law requires gasoline pumps to post the price and to have a totalizer showing total amounts and the total price purchased. These functions are inspected regularly by the state assuring uniform quality. The present statute places an unnecessary burden on the gasoline dealer while also causing a delay in the transaction for the consumer while a ticket is being completed. And so today we have many service stations breaking this law and this is because they do not give a ticket to each purchaser. The purpose of this bill is to exempt the sale of gasoline from this law as it would serve no purpose in today's marketing practices. Now I would like to talk to you about the amendment and this amendment is on page 993 in the Journal. One of the Senators in this body approached me and says he didn't feel like we should exempt gasoline or exempt issuing the sales ticket entirely when a customer purchased gasoline, and so what this amendment would do, it would exempt sales of motor fuels if less than \$100 and, of course, we'd still leave in the bill other bulk sales of \$20, a sales slip would still have to be issued at this time, and so therefore I would urge adoption of this amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Vickers, do you wish to be recognized? This is going to be the last bill that we take up this morning. We will recess for an hour and a half and then go for about that length of time and then we will adjourn. Senator Vickers, do you wish to be recognized?

SENATOR VICKERS: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, members, I

rise to support Senator Hefner's amendment to LB 678. Senator Hefner was kind enough to amend the bill at my suggestion yesterday because I was concerned that we would remove from the statutes the requirement of leaving a ticket for any amount of fuel that might be delivered in the bulk and recognizing that that could be thousands of dollars and it was not Senator Hefner's intention to leave those types of transactions not have a ticket left. So with Senator Hefner's consent, we worked over some language and it is the language that Senator Hefner is offering in this amendment and I certainly appreciate Senator Hefner's willingness to do this and urge the body's adoption of the Hefner amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Hefner amendment. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 mays on the adoption of Senator Hefner's amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the amendment is adopted. Now the motion is to advance the bill. Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Would Senator Hefner yield to a question about the bill?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Certainly.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Senator Hefner, I see some language on lines 6 and 7 of the bill relating to bulk deliveries as being taken out and I thought I was listening carefully to your remarks and didn't hear you make any mention of that bulk delivery language and wonder what the ramifications of that would be.

SENATOR HEFNER: Excuse me, Senator Hoagland, what page?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: On the bill, Senator Hefner, it is a one page bill, lines 6 and 7 shows taking out some existing statutory language relating to bulk deliveries of heating fuel and I didn't hear you say anything about that when you explained the bill and I wonder what effect that has.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, I feel that that language is not necessary because if you start on line 4 it says, "Whenever the quantity is determined by the seller, bulk sales in excess of twenty dollars, except sales...", and this is as

the amendment is inserted, "except sales of motor vehicle fuel of less than one hundred dollars shall be accompanied by a delivery ticket containing the following information:", so you would have if fuel oil or heating fuel is delivered in the bulk in excess of \$20, you would still have to issue a delivery ticket. Am I clear?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I think. In other words, it wouldn't change the law with respect to bulk deliveries of heating fuel by taking that language out?

SENATOR HEFNER: I don't believe so according to the information that I have.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Thank you, Senator Hefner.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion is carried. The bill is advanced. Senator Duda, would you like to recess us? Go ahead. The Clerk has an item and then we will.

Mr. President, a new resolution, LR 270 offered by Senator Newell. (Read. See pages 1424 and 1425, Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over pursuant to our rules, Mr. President.

Finally, Mr. President, Senator Wiitala asks unanimous consent to remove his name as cosponsor from an amendment to LB 652, Request 2652.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any objection? So ordered.

CLERK: That is all that I have, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: All right, is Senator Koch here? I think we will go ahead and pass over Senator Koch's request here until he arrives. We will go to item #5 on General File, the priority bills, the revenue priorities, 757 is the first bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 757 introduced by the Speaker at the request of the Governor. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 11 of this year, referred to the Revenue Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, in the absence of Senator Marvel I suspect that I should take the bill. The bill is very straightforward. There is no committee amendment. It is in its original form to reduce the minimum of the overlevy or cushion from 3% to 2%. was a recommendation from the Governor in a bill that he had introduced by Senator Marvel and I would move that it be moved from General File to E & R Initial.

SENATOR CLARK: We have a motion on the desk.
