Mr. President, two new bills. LB 687 offered by Senators Haberman, Nichol, Kahle and VonMinden. (Read title). LB 688 offered by Senators Fowler, Landis and Wesely. (Read title). LB 689 offered by the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee and signed by its members. (Read title). (See page 144 of the Legislative Journal).

SPEAKER MARVEL: Next take up LB 359.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 359 was a bill introduced by Senator Newell. (Read title). The bill was introduced on January 19 of last year. At that time it was referred to the Urban Affairs Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Urban Affairs Committee, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I am not sure how to proceed procedurally and would ask the opinion of the Chair. There is before the Clerk a substitute amendment which would, in effect, gut all of 359, at least as it is written, and rewrites much of the same provisions placing all responsibility for elections rather than with the SID as it is now currently with the Election Commissioner. Much of what was to be accomplished by the committee amendments and the terms of LB 359 would be accomplished under this substitute amendment but ultimate responsibility would be shifted, and I think since that is what the introducers want to approach now, I would ask that we not handle the committee amendments at this time but proceed to the substitute amendment and since that is in effect the LB 259 incarnation that the introducers want to talk about perhaps we should pass over the committee amendments at this time.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, I was going to suggest to Senator Landis that perhaps since they have changed the bill considerably they might wish to take it back for another hearing. I notice it changes it substantially, whatever that means and I wonder if you would consider that,

that you visit Arbor Lodge and the holdings that the Arbor Lodge Foundation has there and that you plant not one but two trees next spring. Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: The Clerk has some things to read in.

CLERK: Mr. President, your committee on Banking, Commerce and Insurance gives notice of hearing on gubernatorial appointments for Tuesday, January 19.

Mr. President, your committee on Education gives notice of executive session upon adjournment in Room 1517 today, that is Education Committee upon adjournment in Room 1517 today. The Education Committee also gives notice of public hearing on bills for Monday, January 18, Mr. President.

Mr. President, a new bill, LB 766 offered by the Constitutional Revision and Recreation Committee. (Read by title for the first time. See pages 221-222 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, your committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports they have carefully examined and reviewed LB 664 and recommend that same be placed on Select File. That is signed by Senator Kilgarin as Chair.

Mr. President, Senator DeCamp asks unanimous consent to add his name as cointroducer to LB 689. (See page 222 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CLARK: No objection, so ordered. Senator Vickers, on a point of personal privilege. Would you state your point.

SENATOR VICKERS: Thank you, Mr. President, the point that I would like to state is to introduce to the members of the Legislature today a new queen in the State of Nebraska and it is one of our Pages who is down in front of the room and Senator Barrett and I are going to have to share this honor somewhat with you because her address is in Senator Barrett's district but she happens to live in my district and she is here representing the 30th District as a Page and, Verlyne, would you stand up so we can all know who we are talking about. SENATOR KILGARIN: I move we advance LB 807.

Mr. President, LBs 215, 410 and 417 are ready for your signature.

PRESIDENT: While the Legislature is in session and capable of doing business I propose to sign and I do sign LB 417, LB 410 and LB 215. Ready, Mr. Clerk, then for LB 577.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have no E & R amendments to LB 577. I do have a motion to indefinitely postpone the bill. That is offered by Senator Wesely. That would also lay the bill over unless Senator Beutler or Koch agree to take it up at this time.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch or Beutler, do you have any reaction to the motion....there is a motion to indefinitely postpone, what do you wish to do? Senator Koch, did you... what do you wish to do?

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. President, I will leave that to the high and profound ethics of my good friend, Senator Wesely. First of all, I did not like the motion in the first place, but obviously Senator Wesely thinks it is important that we discuss it some more, so why don't we discuss it today.

PRESIDENT: Okay, we will let it go then, Senator Koch, is that all right? Let's debate it today then.

SENATOR KOCH: What's my prerogative here?

PRESIDENT: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR KOCH: I would prefer to take it up today.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Wesely, he would just as soon take it up right now.
