SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Barrett, do you wish to close? SENATOR BARRETT: I'm not sure, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I've had the same feeling at times.

SENATOR BARRETT: My intent was not to stir up the natives. Thank you, Senator Johnson, for those kind remarks with reference to piling on. I think I'm entitled to fifteen yards, correct? I made no secret about this, ladies and gentlemen, not at all. It is straight out, very straight forward. Pull transportation costs from the general budget, levy a special tax. It is exempt from the 7% Budget Limitation Act of 1979. The bill is a loophole. There is no question about it. It is dictated by the severe limitations which have been placed on school districts in your legislative districts and in mine. It is virtually impossible for some of these districts to continue operating under the current levels with the current programs without some assistance. Transportation costs, transportation needs are competing for these educational dollars and as far as I am concerned there is a difference between transportation and education. An exemption, an exception, if some of you prefer, a subsidy. Call it by any name you want. If you have a philosophical problem with it, sobeit. I repeat, I move that LB 498 be moved to E & R initial. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no, the advancement of the bill. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Senator Barrett. Do you want to record the vote? Okay, record the vote.

CLERK: 12 ayes, 28 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator DeCamp, committee amendments.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, since the committee amendments are nothing more than putting in four words that were left out by the bill drafter when the bill was drafted which coordinate with the rest of the bill, what I thought would be proper then would be to explain the whole bill or attempt to and deal with the whole bill rather than just deal with the amendment separately. LB 779 has several sections and several purposes and once again it was a bill introduced at the request of the Nebraska Bankers Association. It deals with matters in banking. As everybody knows, banks also need on occasions to borrow money to meet day to day reserve and other requirement. Okay, Section 1, in line 5, in other words, Section 1 of the bill eliminates a term called "rediscounts and bills payable". The reason this is eliminated is because it is obsolete and nonapplicable language and we substitue instead the modern language of "direct borrowing". Now this section broadens, so everybody understands, I am broadening the

such orders. The purpose of 720 is to close this jurisdictional loophole. I understand that some of the judges are doing it anyway but they feel that they are on shaky ground by ordering custody of the children while the divorce case is pending. CLERK: Mr. President, LB 767 was a bill introduced by Senator Schmit. (Read.) The bill was read on January 11 of this year. At that time it was referred to the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee for a hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President. I have no amendments to the bill.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the bill simply transfers the surplus property from the Military Department to the Department of Correctional Services. Some of you will recall last year we moved that surplus property from the Department of Roads to the Department of Military Services. The reason for the emergency clause on the bill is that that change has not yet taken place. Most of the surplus property is reconditioned and refurbished with the assistance of the persons at the institutions so it seemed to be a much more logical place for the property to be handled. So for that reason we have introduced the bill. There is of course no objection from the Department of Military Services. The Department of Correctional Institutions are in favor of the bill and I would hope that the body would advance the bill rapidly. Thank you.
