

out of the general fund today, why we'd all be working at it. Well I'm telling you, this is a \$50 million minimum savings over the not too distant future. Anyone that has doubts I can take and show you, show you the cases, names crossed out but you won't have any doubt once you read them what is going on. This needs to be done. I urge you to do it because remember this final fact. Insurance companies are simply an agency for collecting a lot of money and paying it out. They are going to always collect long-term, whether it is two, three, five years more, that is their profit, than they pay out. If they are paying out \$50 million fraudulently they're going to collect \$50 million fraudulently from everybody in the state and that is what is occurring. This is a major savings in cost containment for the state. It will help in your medical insurance. It will help in the overall medical costs. I urge you to adopt it.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the advancement of 421. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Has everybody recorded their presence? Okay. Record, yes.

CLERK: There is a quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The next order of business is LB 775.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 775. (Read title). The bill was first read on January 12th, referred to the Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. Mr. President, I have no amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, this bill....Mr. President, this bill is from the Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee and it amends two sections of law relating to credit unions. Under the present law our credit union may contract for a group life insurance policy under specific requirements for the benefit of the share or savings account of its members other than the credit union or its officials. Now, the law not amended since 1965 prohibits term insurance on any member in excess of \$2500. LB 775 deletes the \$2500 maximum insurance requirement. In any event, a credit union would still be prohibited to carry an amount of insurance exceeding the share balance or savings account of the insured member. Ch. Section 2 contains the annual wild card proposal that we do once a year here on S & Ls, credit unions, banks, savings and loans, I don't know what all, which allows state chartered credit unions the same privileges as federal chartered credit unions. Passage of this provision does not relieve credit unions doing business in this state from taxes assessed under applicable state law. This is an annual thing we pass. I move it be advanced.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Is there any further discussion? Okay, the motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. The next item is LB 776.

CLERK: LB 776 offered by the Banking Committee. (Read title.) The bill was first read on January 12th of this year. It was referred to the Banking Committee for hearing. The bill was advanced to General File, Mr. President. I have no amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp, do you wish to explain the bill?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, LB 776 provides for the guarantee of credit union, cooperative credit association, and industrial loan investment company accounts. Section 1 provides that prior to January 1, 1983, credit unions shall maintain insurance of guarantee shares and deposits as provided under the Federal Credit Union Act or by membership in a corporation organized pursuant to the Nebraska Depository Guarantee Corporation Act. Just for your information, remember it was a few years ago we started deciding that industrials and some other people didn't have insurance. You know, you go and deposit your money in a bank and you have FDIC, so what we did was we set up by state law the national...or the Nebraska Depository Guarantee Corporation Act so that we would have the funds of these people protected, so we are expanding it with this then to make sure we can cover anybody that is involved. Okay, Section 2 states that prior to January 1, 1983, cooperative credit associations shall maintain insurance or guarantee shares and deposits by membership in a corporation organized pursuant to the NDGCA, that is that Nebraska thing we set up as I told you. Section 3 requires that prior to January 1, 1983, industrial loan and investment companies shall maintain insurance or guarantee certificates of indebtedness by membership in a corporation organized pursuant to the NDGCA. Institutions organized after January 1, 1983, will also be required to insure or guarantee shares, accounts, deposits and certificates. The Director of the Banking Department would be permitted to extend the mandatory coverage date for one year to any of the foregoing financial institutions upon certain conditions. So what we are doing is we are going to make sure that these accounts out there are insured and the people have some protection.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance LB 776 as explained by Senator DeCamp. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.
