SPEAKER MARVEL PRESIDING

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Sieck, do you want to record your presence? Senator Lowell Johnson, would you record your presence, please? Senator Sieck. Okay, record the vote.

CLERK: There is a quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Clerk has some items on the desk.

CLERK: Mr. President, two new bills. LB 795 offered by Senators Wesely and Warner. (Read title). LB 796 offered by Senator Koch. (Read title). (See page 245 of the Legislative Journal).

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, we will now discuss LB 338. Senator Cope, do you wish to speak to the bill?

SENATOR COPE: Mr. President and members, after hearing the debate this morning I firmly believe there will be a fiscal impact, now not today but in the future. We are, if we do, passing a mandatory law requiring that school districts comply with the law, and either the local school district or the state are going to pay the costs. Now I am afraid I know where the costs will be paid and that is by the local school district. The state hasn't been known too well for its way of passing a law and then not backing it up with cash. I also think that we are taking responsibility away from the Department of Education and local school districts. I, for one, certainly am not as well versed of what the school districts should teach as the Department of Education and local school boards. So I will oppose LB 338.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Vard Johnson.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I want to rise in total and wholehearted support of LB 338. I want to begin by calling your attention again to the Nebraska Constitution, a document that we all ought to familiarize ourselves with as the occasion arises. Section 1 Article VII of the Nebraska Constitution says: "The Legislature shall provide for the free instruction in the common schools of this state of all persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years. The Legislature may provide for the education of other persons in educational institutions owned and controlled by the state or a political subdivision thereof." That provision has been in our organic law for a century. What that means very simply is that the State Legislature genuinely sits as the school board for the schools in the

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion before the House is the Newell proposal, the withdrawal of LB 211. He has closed. All those in favor of the motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to withdraw the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is withdrawn. The Clerk has some items to read in.

CLERK: Mr. President, your committee on Education whose Chairman is Senator Koch to whom was referred LB 796 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File; 845 General File; 472A indefinitely postponed; 607 indefinitely postponed; 789 indefinitely postponed. All signed by Senator Koch as Chairman.

Mr. President, I have a communication from the Appropriations Committee and signed by its Chairman. And I understand that the preliminary budget report of the Appropriations Committee has been distributed. That document will be filed in my office.

Mr. President, new resolution, LR 215, signed by Senators Warner, Lowell Johnson, Cope, Goodrich and Stoney. (Read LR 215 as found on pages 553 and 554 of the Legislative Journal). That will be inserted in the Journal and laid over, Mr. President, pursuant to our rules.

Mr. President, I have an amendment to LR 215 offered by Senators Warner, Dworak, Fowler, Rumery and Marsh. That will be printed in the Journal. (See pages 555 and 556 of the Journal).

Senator Wiitala moves to place LB 835 on General File notwithstanding the action of the committee. That, too, will be laid over.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The next order of business is a report of the Public Works Committee and the Chair recognizes Senator Wesely.

CLERK: Mr. President, the report is found on page 487 of the Journal.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, the Public Works Committee would like to recommend would seldom be used but as we were looking through a variety of the statutes trying to find ways to enhance the revenue to the general fund, it appeard that this was a process that would be appropriate and might be needed on occasion. I move the bill be advanced.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: A quick question of Senator Warner if I may. If the political subdivision involved is the recipient of more than from one political...from more than one aid fund, how does the director determine which fund is to be debited or credited whichever is done. Is there some procedure for that that is standard procedure already or am I in need of clarification in that regard.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, it doesn't specify as to which one except that it has to come from the general...it has to be a state aid program that is paid out of the general fund so it would be which ever one that came up subsequent to the time frame. There is not a specific one identified.

SENATOR BEUTLER: It would be your intent that it would be which ever fund is next up for payment?

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance LB 931. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. The next bill is LB 796.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 796 offered by Senator Koch. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 12, referred to Education for hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. Mr. President, I have no amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body, LB 796 was introduced on behalf of our postsecondary education institutions and it very simply deals with some provisions of residency and it is very narrowly classified to mean only resident aliens. Presently our law says they must live here

two years and that law is in conflict with the federal Constitution. So what we are doing is we are bringing it down to 180 days which is in conformity with the Constitution. A resident alien, in case you are not aware of that, would be for instance we have quite a number of people who have come here from the east, Vietnamese and others, and it means now presently...we know they are residents but they have to stay here for two years before they get the privilege of the nonresident type of tuition. So what we are doing is we are saying it is 180 days. There is one other factor that it helps is that is we hire many people to come into our institutions to teach or to administer, whatever. So this also provides those employees of the university or state colleges, wherever it might be, the privilege of their sons and daughters to enter into those institutions for a resident fee rather than have to stick around two years to be eligible. That is what the issue of LB 796 is all about.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: A question of Senator Koch please.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch, do you yield?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Koch, the dependents of the alien now has the 180 days privilege, right?

SENATOR KOCH: Pardon.

SENATOR HABERMAN: The dependents of the alien now (interruption) a resident in 180 days?

SENATOR KOCH: What we are doing there is we would make them immediately eligible for a residence.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So you are making it that the

SENATOR KOCH: For resident tuition purposes, Senator Haberman, that is what we are doing.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, but you are changing this so that the parents now also have only 180 days?

SENATOR KOCH: That is correct.

SENATOR HABERMAN: What are the benefits going to be for those parents?

SENATOR KOCH: Well, the fact that after 180 days of residence in this state, they would be eligible for the resident tuition

rather than the nonresident tuition.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So the parents then will have the same privilege as their children...?

SENATOR KOCH: Yes, sir, if you were from Vietnam and you were a student here and you had children that may be also eligible though, then it means they would be eligible as well.

SENATOR HABERMAN: All right, thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Vard Johnson.

SENATOR VARD JOHNSON: I just have a very quick question, Mr. Speaker, of Senator Koch if he would yield and that is this, Senator Koch, because you did speak of Vietnamese persons, I just want to make certain that the intention behind this legislation is that if someone is paroled into our country, that is the expression which the immigration service uses, as a refugee, they are not eligible under the immigration law to even apply for permanent resident alien status until they have been here one full year but we can have a refugee from Vietnam or Haiti or some other place paroled into the United States and into Nebraska and they will have been here 180 days and it is clear to the world they intend to live in Nebraska permanently and if they can show that, then they should be treated as a resident permanent alien, is that correct?

SENATOR KOCH: That is correct.

SENATOR VARD JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator Koch. I wholeheartedly endorse your bill.

SENATOR KOCH: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch, do you wish to close?

SENATOR KOCH: I have no closing. I would just request that we advance LB 796 to E & R Initial.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.
