Mr. President, Senator Goodrich would move to withdraw LB 865. That will lay over.

Mr. President, I have a unanimous consent request from Senator Kahle to add his name to 846 as cointroducer; Senator Wagner to 846.

SENATOR CLARK: No objections, so ordered. There is no one left to object.

CLERK: Mr. President, new bills. (Read by title for the first time, LBs 956-966 as found on page 366-369 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CLARK: Senator DeCamp, would you like to make your momentous speech at this time.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, I would like to ask unanimous consent to take up LB 376 on Final.

SENATOR CLARK: Right now? No objections, so ordered.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, in the alternative, I'll move that we adjourn until nine o'clock tomorrow.

SENATOR CLARK: All those in favor say aye, opposed. We are adjourned until nine o'clock tomorrow morning.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 20 ayes, 12 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Chambers' amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: The motion fails. We are back on the original amendment. There is nothing else on the amendment. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Let it rip.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the adoption of the resolution. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. A record vote has been requested. Senator Clark voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting yes.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: (Read the record vote as found on pages 1045 and 1046 of the Legislative Journal.) 33 ayes, 9 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to adopt the resolution.

SENATOR CLARK: The motion carried and the resolution is adopted. We will now go to item #5. Do you have anything to read in, Mr. Clerk? All right, go ahead.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would like to print amendments to LB 870. Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would like to print amendments to LB 816. (See pages 1042 through 1044 of the Legislative Journal.) And your committee on Government, Military and Veterans Affairs whose Chairman is Senator Kahle instructs me to report LB 956 advanced to General File with committee amendments attached. (See page 1046 of the Journal.) And, Mr. President, your committee on Public Health gives notice of hearing for gubernatorial appointment hearings. (See page 1046 of the Journal.)

SENATOR CLARK: We will now go to item #5 and we will take up LB 817.

Mr. President, explanation of vote offered by Senator Hoagland. I have an amendment from Senator Hoagland to LB 956 he would like printed in the Journal. (See page 1768 of the Legislative Journal.)

I have a communication from the Governor. (Read communication regarding LBs 739 and 892 as found in the Journal on page 1767.)

Mr. President, the Governor has delivered Constitutional Amendment, LB 766, without his action.

PRESIDENT: Anything further? Senator Lamb, what do you wish to do? Do you wish to take up anything before noon or do you want to break now and come back? Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, I move that we recess until 1:30.

PRESIDENT: All right, motion is to recess until 1:30. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed nay. We are in recess until 1:30.
