SENATOR LAMB: Senator Barrett.

SENATOR BARRETT: Thank you Mr. President and members, Senator Wesely, this resolution is not garbage. This is an annual exercise again the body must go through in approving the contracts between the various bargaining units, the contracts have been agreed to between the parties to the contracts. They have been approved by the Attorney General's office and must now, according to statute, be approved by the Legislature. I would move the adoption.

SENATOR LAMB: Motion is the adoption of the resolution. All those in support vote yes, those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 37 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of the resolution.

SENATOR LAMB: Resolution is adopted. Next resolution, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the final resolution I have is LR 386 offered by Senator Hoagland. It is found on page 1945 of the Journal. (Read LR 386).

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, this resolution is of a different stripe. It really is a serious resolution indeed which is addressed to the Soviet Ambassador to the United Nations, the Council General in San Francisco, the Soviet Ambassador to Washington, D.C. to the United States of America and to Mr. Brezhnev. It calls on those officials to cease all harassment and pressure on Jews in the Soviet Union who wish to immigrate to Israel and unite with their families in Israel and in particular it calls on the Soviet Union to permit one Ida Nudel the right to depart for Israel immediately. Now, some of you may know Ida Nudel was arrested by Soviet authorities four years ago for posting a sign in her Moscow apartment requesting that she be permitted to immigrate to Israel. She was subsequently sentenced to four years of exile in Siberia. She has just completed her fourth winter in Siberia and there is some question as to whether she will be permitted to immigrate to Israel. This resolution is directed towards increasing her chances of receiving that. This resolution has been passed in virtually identical forms by at least one other legislature in the United States, I'd encourage its adoption here. Thank you.
